## From Director General's Desk

#### Professor Sachin Chaturvedi

The COVID-19 health crisis continued to have serious socioeconomic impact across the world during the year 2021-22. RIS, with its consistent commitments, continued to provide analytical support by bringing together various stakeholders to discuss about how to meet the challenges thrown up by this unprecedented health crisis at regional, sub-regional and multilateral levels.

For the RIS Annual Report 2021-22, we requested our faculty members to write their take on different aspects of the RIS work programme. In this regard, Chapter 1 by Dr Bhaskar Balakrishnan discusses our research pillar related to global issues and development cooperation architecture. It highlights various RIS initiatives on this broad theme and related issues. Among others it has focus on the temporary waiver of TRIPS provisions.

Emerging challenges in development cooperation forced by in ward looking trends in developed nations brought forth another set of crises. To address this, Forum for Indian Development Cooperation (FIDC) at RIS took the lead and discuss issues related to post-COVID-19 development challenges in the context of South-South cooperation.

As part of the Special Week of 'Azadi Ka Amrit Mahotsav', RIS also organised a week-long exhibition on India's development cooperation that is a saga of commitment to plurality, diversity and collective progress. A report on this subject was also launched on this occasion. Effective implementation of Agenda 2030 and realization of Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) continue to be an integral part of the institute's work programme.

In order to have greater focus on issues related to development, as part of the work programme for India's preparation for G-20 Presidency, RIS organised a number of discussion meetings. The institute also undertook series of activities in view of India as Chair of BRICS forum.

Chapter 2 by Professor S. K. Mohanty, Dr Priyadarshi Dash and Dr Pankhuri Gaur discusses RIS initiatives on trade, investment and regional cooperation. It deals with our efforts in the spheres of multilateralism, WTO, MC-12, Fishery subsidy, dealing with regionalism, mechanism for financial cooperation. RIS also brought out its flagship publication, the *World Trade and Development Report* that presented a critical overview of intricacies between technology and development relationship.

The focus of Chapter 3 by Dr Prabir De is on trade facilitation, connectivity and regional cooperation. It covers ASEAN-India relationship, work programme of ASEAN-India Centre at RIS, connectivity cooperation in Indo-Pacific, maritime security in the Indo-Pacific, training and capacity building and dissemination, BIMSTEC, India-EU partnership, etc.

Similarly, the RIS work programme on new technologies and development issues and activites or the, Forum for Indian Traditional Medicine are discussed in detail in Chapter 4 by Dr Ravi K Srinivas, Dr Amit Kumar and Dr Sneha Sinha and Chapter 4B by Dr Namrata Pathak.

The Annual Report also has a separate Chapter 5 on "Gender Equality in Social Cohesion Perspectives" by Dr Beena Pandey that calls upon the G-20 member countries to work effectively for bringing about desired improvements in the socio-economic conditions of women. The report also gives details about the publications that the institute brought out for disseminating its policy research outputs. RIS faculty members also contributed to outside policy dialogues and publications.

We are grateful to our Chairman, Ambassador Dr Mohan Kumar; all Members of RIS Governing Council and General Body; and Amb. S. T. Devare, Chairman and other members of the RIS Research Advisory Council for their continuous guidance and support for our research programme. We extend our gratitude to the Government of India, particularly the Ministry of External Affairs, Ministry of Finance, Department of Economic Affairs, Ministry of Commerce and Industry, Department of Science and Technology, Ministry of AYUSH and other partner organizations for support received from them.

We also take this opportunity to convey thanks to all RIS faculty members and colleagues from administration, IT, publication and library wings for their contribution in execution of the research agenda and related programme of RIS.

## **Responding to the COVID Pandemic**

The year 2021-22 witnessed a major impact of the COVID-19 pandemic across the globe. The emergence of new virulent strains with increased infectivity outpaced the global response, with shortages of diagnostics, vaccines, therapeutics and medical infrastructure. Many countries responded with partial or complete restrictions on movement, resulting in disruption of the economy. Developing countries, especially in Africa were particularly hard hit, while the advanced countries were far better placed to acquire vaccines. The response to the pandemic exposed major fault lines in global cooperation. Affordable access to vaccines, therapeutics and diagnostics became a high priority issue. In this situation, India and South Africa launched an initiative at the WTO for a temporary waiver of TRIPS provisions for vaccines and medical equipment needed to fight COVID-19. While this move was strongly supported by developing countries and many non governmental organisations, it met with strong resistance from several advanced countries and large multinational pharmaceutical companies. In order to meet this challenge, RIS launched a series of public webinars on the issue of TRIPS waiver for COVID-19 on this issue at global and regional levels, to enhance public awareness and support for the India-South African initiative. Thus, RIS in collaboration with the South Centre, Geneva, organised webinars on 'TRIPS Waiver: Issues and Challenges' (5 June 2021), 'TRIPS Waiver: Issues and Challenges for Africa' (12 June 2021), 'TRIPS Waiver: Issues and Challenges for Latin America' (19 June 2021), and 'TRIPS Waiver: Issues and Challenges for South East Asia' (26 June 2021), with a wide spectrum of experts from these regions.

During the height of the COVID-19 pandemic, India, despite its own needs, had generously made vaccines and therapeutics available bilaterally and multilaterally to many countries in need, including even the US. India had decided to make available free of charge its unique Co-WIN Public APIs (for appointments and vaccine certificate downloads) for use by third party applications. Several countries had expressed interest in adapting and using this technology. India's readiness to share its experience and expertise regarding the COVID-19 vaccination programme rollout with the help of the digital technology with other countries, especially those in Africa and the Global South, had attracted wide interest. To build further on this, a Webinar was organised by GDC- RIS on 'Coping with COVID: Experiences of Developing Countries in Vaccine Platforms and Rollout' (19 May 2021).

#### **Building economic recovery post-COVID**

The increasing impact of control measures and pick up of vaccination rates across the world, resulted in reduction in COVID-19 intensity, though unevenly, and always with the ever present threat of new variants in the background. Attention turned to mitigating the economic impact of the pandemic and helping economies to recover. Here again, there was a wide variety of tools and measures adopted across the globe, depending on the severity of the economic impact and the status of the pandemic. The importance of finding the most appropriate set of tools and economic measures emerged. In the G20, India, a major developing country member and future chair of the G20 for 2023, had concerns that conditions related to climate change were sought to be imposed by advanced countries on economic recovery packages and mechanisms. Such advocacy of a 'green recovery' with stringent conditionalities could be regarded as a form of 'green colonisation' at a time when the developing world was hard hit by the COVID-19 pandemic and was struggling for a recovery. With this in mind, RIS organised a webinar on "Priorities for Growth and Stability in Post-COVID World: Role of G20 Framework Working Group" on 9 April 2021. It was stressed that India was the only G20 country that has met the Paris climate change agreement commitments. Moreover, India's per capita emissions and historic cumulative missions were far lower than many G20 countries. The move in the G20 to push for new commitments beyond the Paris Agreement was totally unjustified while there was little progress on the promised USD 100 billion in climate finance for developing nations (by 2020 with a higher annual goal by 2025).

The unprecedented development challenges and emerging negative trends in development cooperation, particularly reduced assistance from the North and multilateral organisations had created a development crisis. There was a need for enhancing development cooperation in the wake of COVID-19 and increasing development finance in an environment of geopolitical tensions, the need for increased triangular cooperation. Also, there was the need for financing infrastructure development like healthcare, education etc in developing countries. The situation was worsened by inward looking trends in developed nations. To focus attention on these issues, RIS and its Forum for Indian Development Cooperation (FIDC), organised a panel discussion, as on the topic: New Challenges to Development Cooperation in a Post-COVID World (24 September, 2021).

#### **Tackling Climate Change**

On the occasion of the launch of 'The Palgrave Handbook of Development Cooperation for Achieving the 2030 Agenda,' a panel discussion was organised by NeST, RIS on 26 October 2021. A Panel Discussion on "Future Strategies for SIDS and Climate Change: Looking through the Lens of SouthSouth Cooperation Practices" was held virtually on 1 November, 2021 to analyse climate change vulnerability and potential use of South-South Cooperation practices and experiences to take care of the threats to SIDS existence. RIS and Vijnana Bharti (Vibha) jointly organized a webinar on 'Issues and Challenges during the Run-Up to and at COP 26 – Indian Perspectives' on 24 October 2021. The 41st STIP Forum Lecture was delivered online by Dr Ajay Mathur, Director General, International Solar Alliance, on 28 February 2022 on "Enabling the Global Energy Transition: India

in the World" on the energy transitions happening in the world and in India, and the important role of renewable energy and non-fossil electricity generation.

#### **BRICS** Chairmanship

India, as Chair of BRICS had to steer this group through a very challenging period. The BRICS Civil Forum provides the opportunity for establishing deeper partnerships among BRICS countries through people-to-people exchanges and highlights the important role played by civil society in facing the present difficult challenges. The theme for the Indian chair of the BRICS civil society forum led by RIS was "Intra-BRICS Cooperation with Continuity, Consolidation and Consensus". The focus areas were - Reformed Multilateralism, Technological and Digital solutions for Sustainable Development Goals, Counter Terrorism Cooperation, and Enhancing P2P cooperation. RIS has been selected to serve as the nodal organisation for the BRICS Civil Society Forum.

RIS organized a series of activities during the year. The meetings organised were - Dialogue on Wellness, Health and Traditional Systems of Medicines in BRICS (24 May 2021), Dialogue on BRICS Economies and Women's Participation: The Institutional Response (4 June 2021), Dialogue on Quality of Economic Growth and Inclusion: A Regional Development Perspective (10 June 2021), Dialogue on Future of Education and Skills: New Paradigm of Learning in BRICS (21 June 2021). A curtain raiser meeting for the BRICS Civil Forum 2021 was held on 16-17 April 2021.

The activities culminated with the BRICS Civil Forum final programme (28-29 July 2021), focused on themes such as "Inclusive Development and Promotion of Entrepreneurship in BRICS: Role of Technology"; "People's Participation on Sustainability: The BRICS Experience"; and "Consolidating BRICS Civil Process". The recommendations from this meeting included expediting reforms in multilateral institutions, an inclusive and participatory approach towards sustainable development, collective Action for Global Public Goods (GPGs) and SDGs, a 'BRICS Framework on One Health', forging alliances through 'Women BRICS', localization of development and partnerships, the role of technology in enabling the shift from entitlements to entrepreneurship/ social entrepreneurship, etc. It was also recommended to set up a Working Group to institutionalise BRICS Civil process and to enable lasting engagement among leading CSOs from all the BRICS member countries. All these activities were carried out despite the limitations arising from the COVID-19 pandemic, making full use of ICT tools. RIS, in collaboration with ORF, has organised the BRICS Academic Forum in 2021.

#### **Preparing for India's G20 Presidency**

RIS was deeply engaged with the Think20 - one of the important Engagement Groups of the G20. It pressed for greater representation from developing country think-tanks, and taking cognizance of their policy recommendations. This assumes importance in the context of Indonesia, India, Brazil and South Africa assuming G20 Presidency in 2022, 2023, 2024 and 2025, respectively. The objective is to give greater focus on the development agenda in the G20 and its Engagement Groups. RIS held a virtual Brainstorming Session on 'T20 Reforms for Upcoming G20 Developing Country Presidencies' (24 November 2021). RIS organised a special Panel Discussion on 'Women's Issues in G-20 and Way Forward' on Women's Day on 8 March 2022, on women's issues in the G20 context. The target set by G20 for reducing the gender gap in labour force participation rate by 2025 still needs to be achieved in several G20 countries. RIS, in collaboration with the Global Solutions Initiative, Germany has organised a Virtual Seminar as part of the G20 Finance Track on 'Post-Pandemic Infrastructure and Global Public Goods in the G20' on 18 February 2022.

#### **Celebrating 75 years of India's Development Cooperation**

As part of the Special Week of Azadi Ka Amrit Mahotsav (AKAM), RIS organised a week long (21-27 Febriuary 2022) Exhibition on 75 Years of Development Partnership – Saga of Commitment to Plurality, Diversity and Collective Progress RIS brought out a report on this subject. Hon'ble Minister of State for External Affairs and Culture of India, Smt Meenakshi Lekhi inaugurated the exhibition at a special programme held on 21 February 2022. This exhibition was visited by Dr Rajkumar Ranjan Singh, Hon'ble Minister of State for External Affairs, diplomats from Delhi, senior officials from the Ministry of External Affairs, other dignitaries and many students from across the country. The exhibition and the report high; lighted India's world leadership on 'development cooperation' and the country's support to the Global South through technology transfer, capacity building, humanitarian aid as well as financial assistance is unconditional and in the spirit of the Vedantic mantra 'Vasudhaiva Kutumbakam'. The report highlighted that the quantum of development assistance provided by India from 1947 to 2022 is to the tune of \$127 billion; and that training had been provided to 350,000 people from other nations in the developing world through several initiatives, including the Indian Technical and Economic Cooperation Programme (ITEC). The Lines of Credit provided by India are close to \$31 billion, and about half of it was to the neighboring countries. After the COVID-19 outbreak, India has provided vaccines to over 90 countries and \$4 billion in aid and grant to around 100 countries. The exhibition showcased India's development cooperation initiatives in various countries across different regions by bringing on board national institutions of the Government of India, major public and private entities, civil society organizations and social entrepreneurs.

#### **Boosting South-South and Regional Cooperation**

To advance sharing of ideas, innovations, and solutions across developing countries and beyond, RIS signed a Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) with Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation (BMGF) through its specialized wing, Global Development Centre (GDC). GDC-RIS and BMGF will work together towards strengthening and building new partnerships for South-South cooperation in areas such as nutrition, health systems, pandemic preparedness, agriculture, digital financial inclusion, and women empowerment and other key development issues.

RIS-GDC's project, 'Creating Digital Public Goods for Global South' was selected as part of solutions. The project highlighted the pioneering achievements of Co-WIN as a best practice for suitable adoption in Asia and Africa. RIS-GDC participated as part of the Indian delegation in the Paris Peace Forum (PPF) (November 2021) in the wake of the global impact of COVID-19.. The Forum for Indian Development Cooperation (FIDC-RIS) organised a panel discussion, as part of its monthly seminar series, on the topic 'Pandemics and New Frontiers of South-South Cooperation' on 18th October 2021, to shed light on the status of Agenda 2030 and how the situation has worsened due to the ongoing COVID-19 pandemic. RIS, jointly with the Indian Council of World Affairs (ICWA), the German Institute for Global and Area Studies (GIGA), and the German Institute for International and Security Affairs (SWP) organised a Indo-German 1.5 Track Dialogue, 2022, on 24 February 2022. As part of its work programme on Sustainable Development Goals, the institute organised its flagship capacity building programme on SDGs.

#### **Cooperation with the Asian region**

Following the 2021 publication of "Advancing South-South Cooperation: India's Development Partnerships with Pacific Island Countries (PIC)" from the Asian Foundation and RIS and supported by the Australian Department of Foreign Affairs and Trade (DFAT), a consultation webinar on 'Advancing IndiaAustralia-Pacific Islands Development Cooperation' was held on 31 March 2022. The discussion focused on and explored the history and prospects for India-PICs partnership and points of convergence between Australia's and India's interests in the PICs.

RIS and Tripura University jointly organized an international seminar on "Development Cooperation between India and Neighbouring Countries: Possibilities and Challenges" on 22-24 March 2022 at the Department of Economics, Tripura University, Agartala. The seminar provided an excellent platform for rfor sharing research studies on issues concerning the North-eastern region, and development partnership with all neighbouring countries. Experts from India, Bangladesh and Nepal participated in this international seminar. A two week Research Capacity Building Programme on Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) was conducted by RIS and North East Training, Research and Advocacy Foundation (NETRA) for young north eastern research scholars during 14-18 March, 2022 at RIS, New Delhi. Fifteen research scholars joined the programme from eight different north eastern states.Dr Rajkumar Ranjan Singh, Hon'ble Minister of State for External Affairs interacted with the participants and stressed that the SDGs should be achieved by integrating the local knowledge and practices with modern knowledge without harming the originality of the region

To Celebrate Thirty Years of ASEAN-India Relations, a webinar was held on February 18, 2022 on the theme of 'Evolving Strategic Architecture in Indo-Pacific: Perspectives from India and ASEAN'. It focused on the recent academic and policy discourses and India's foreign policy formulation, and recent initiatives in the Indo-Pacific for peaceful resolution of disputes and sustainabile development. A Panel Discussion on "Building Post COVID-19 Economic Resilience in Asia and Pacific", was held on 29 July, 2021, on issues pertaining to resilient economic recovery, financing challenges and climaterelated sovereign risk management in Asia and the Pacific in general and India in particular.

#### **Recognition of RIS work programmes**

Hon'ble Minister of State for External Affairs and Culture, India, Smt. Meenakshi Lekhi, visited RIS on 30 December 2021 for an interactive session about the work programme of RIS. The Hon'ble Minister interacted with all faculty members and applauded the efforts of RIS in the above areas to serve as a think tank of developing countries.

#### Development Cooperation between India & Neighbouring Countries: Possibilities & Challenges

In his keynote address, Professor Sachin Chaturvedi, Director General of RIS, emphasized on the regional connectivity and greater development cooperation with neighbouring countries. The discussion was moderated by Professor Sachin Chaturvedi, Director General, RIS.

Webinar organised by GDC at RIS on 'Coping with COVID: Experiences of Developing Countries in Vaccine Platforms and Rollout' on 19 May 2021. Significantly, Dr R. S. Sharma, CEO, National Health Authority, said privacy protection and prevention of cyberattacks were given utmost importance while developing the national portal and when it was decided to make available Co-WIN Public APIs (for appointments and vaccine certificate downloads) for use by third party applications.

Professor Sachin Chaturvedi, Director General, RIS, said the rise of 'ABCD' (Artificial intelligence, Blockchain, Cloud computing and Data analysis) was influencing and facilitating access to technology. "India's efforts have, in a way, created new platforms for sharing vaccines for their equitable distribution and facilitating access, equity and inclusion with this framework," he said.

Ambassador Amar Sinha, Chairman, Advisory

Committee-GDC and Distinguished Fellow, RIS, pointed out that representatives from four important African countries – Nigeria, Kenya, Uganda and Rwanda – participated in the webinar to share their experiences and challenges relating to their vaccine programmes. He said, like in the case of water, where every drop is precious, regarding vaccines too every dose/jab is important to ensure that everyone gets access to stay healthy and safe.

Dr Sandeep Bhalla, Associate Vice President-Projects, ECHO India, moderated the discussion. Experts who also spoke on the occasion included Mr Hassan Sibomana, Director, Vaccination Unit, Rwanda Biomedical Centre (RBC), Dr Abdullahi Bulama Garba, Director (Planning, Research and Statistics), National Primary Health Care Development Agency (NPHCDA), Nigeria and Dr Rose Jalang'o, Strategic Information Management and Communications Officer, National Vaccines and Immunisation Program (NVIP), Kenya.

#### **Building economic recovery post-COVID**

### Priorities for Growth and Stability in Post-COVID World: Role of G20 Framework Working Group

India, a leader of the developing world, strongly opposed attempts from developed countries to prioritise climate changerelated issues at the G20 discussions without a consensus within the influential bloc comprising 20 major global economies. New Delhi described such attempts pushing for a 'green recovery' with stringent conditionalities as one that will amount to a form of 'green colonisation' at a time when the developing world was vulnerable on account of the COVID-19

pandemic and was looking at somehow recovering from the aftermath of the global health crisis.

"We do have the Paris agreement (on climate change mitigation) and we need to adhere to that. The great danger of putting it in G20 and that too without a consensus (among G20 members), is actually diluting it. Far from helping the cause, it would instead be a diversion from what was agreed by everybody (in the Paris agreement) and would end up in a parallel track," said Dr Sanjeev Sanyal, Principal Economic Advisor, Ministry of Finance, India. He was speaking at a webinar organised by RIS on "Priorities for Growth and Stability in Post-COVID World: Role of G20 Framework Working Group" on 9 April 2021.

Speaking on the occasion, Amb. P. Harish, Additional Secretary (Economic Relations), Ministry of External Affairs, India, said India was the only G20 country that has met the Paris climate change agreement commitments. Referring to the move to establish a new goal post outside the Paris framework in the G20 or in some other framework, he said there was a developmental cost to taking on such new commitments outside the Paris framework. There was nothing on the table regarding what all would constitute the USD 100 billion climate finance for developing nations (by 2020 and set a higher annual goal by 2025), and whether every Official Development Assistance would be added to this number, as well as regarding technology transfer commitments, he said. Even if carbon emissions peak in 2050, the net total of emissions of India will be less than that of China, the US and the European Union, he said. "It would not be correct to ignore the historic case load and the developmental situation, where India's per capita GDP is 5 per cent of that of the G7 countries, and a fraction of the overall G20 per capita, and that India's low per capita energy consumption," he pointed out. Constraining India's options at this point through other extra conditionalities will impose a huge financial and developmental cost, Amb. P. Harish said.

Professor Sachin Chaturvedi, Director General, RIS, chaired the session, while Professor Kevin Gallagher, Professor of Global Development Policy, Frederick S. Pardee School of Global Studies, Boston University, Mr Federico Bonaglia, Deputy Director, OECD Development Centre, Paris and Dr Priyadarshi Dash, Associate Professor, RIS, also spoke on the occasion.

The panel was moderated by Mr Artemy Izmestiev, UNOSSC, Istanbul, with concluding remarks by Professor Milindo Chakrabarti,Visiting Fellow, RIS. The editors of the handbook highlighted the importance and relevance of the book for practitioners in developing countries. Development cooperation needs to be taken ahead to collectively achieve the Agenda 2030. The discussants pointed out the importance of contestation and the need for developing countries to learn from each other in advancing mutual goals.

#### Women's Issues in G-20 and Way Forward

RIS organised a special Panel Discussion on 'Women's Issues in G-20 and Way Forward' on Women's Day on 8 March 2022 in virtual mode. Dr Namrata Pathak, Consultant, RIS, gave the welcome remarks and Dr Pankhuri Gaur, Assistant Professor, moderated the panel discussion. Professor Pam Rajput, Department cum Centre for Women's Studies and Development, Panjab University; Professor Lekha S. Chakraborty, National Institute of Public Finance and Policy (NIPFP); and Dr Beena Pandey, Assistant Professor, RIS were the main panelists during the discussion. Professor Pam Rajput, in her presentation gave an overview of women's issues in G20 and highlighted that W20 urged all the countries to advance member states policies towards the '25 by 25' target set by G20 for reducing the gender gap in labour force participation rate by 2025 by putting forward a national plan of actions. She mentioned that this is one of the commitments that still needs to be achieved in several G20 countries. She further emphasized the issues of labour, finance, gender budgeting and technology and stressed on the commitments of the G20 national and international mechanisms.

## Global Economic Governance and Cooperation BRICS Chairmanship BRICS Civil Forum 2021

The BRICS Civil Forum final programme, held on 28-29 July 2021 was inaugurated by the Hon'ble Minister of State for External Affairs, Dr Rajkumar Ranjan Singh and in his address, he emphasised that the platform of Civil Forum is a tool providing an opportunity for establishing deeper partnerships among BRICS countries through people-to-people exchanges. The important role played by civil society in representing the collective voice of the people and in responding to local needs, was also highlighted in his Inaugural Address.

Ben Joubert, South Africa's BRICS Sous-Sherpa delivered the Special remarks; wherein they appreciated the theme of "Continuity, Consolidation and Consensus" under India's BRICS Chairship this year and extended their full support in making BRICS Civil Forum successful.

## **BRICS Academic Forum 2021**

RIS and ORF jointly organised the BRICS Academic Forum on August 3-6, 2021, under India's presidency of the BRICS in 2021. The BRICS Academic Forum convened academics, experts, researchers and analysts on a range of international policy issues affecting the five BRICS nations and the world in the run up to the BRICS Leaders Summit.

The forum started with the inaugural opening plenary session on Post-Pandemic World Order: Challenges and Opportunities for BRICS. Dr Samir Saran, President, Observer Research Foundation delivered the opening remarks; inaugural

address was given by Dr S. Jaishanker, Hon'ble Union Minister for External Affairs, Government of India. Professor Sachin Chaturvedi, Director General, RIS, also addressed the inaugural session and at the end extended the vote of thanks.

Day II started with the session on Road to COP26: BRICS Climate Agenda. The panel focused on exploring the global progress on the Paris Agreement and took stock of how the developed and developing nations have fared in their commitments. The session also looked to outline a BRICS proposition on climate negotiations, targets and partnerships, which can ensure climate action in conjunction with developmental goals.

Day III discussed the BRICS agenda for trade and resilient supply chains. This panel explored how



the BRICS grouping can formulate a 21st-century international trading framework, which can serve the needs of developing and emerging nations. The session looked to put forth a BRICS-led international trading regime that reduces disruptions and streamlines regulations to promote a greater flow in goods and services.

The last day session was on Building a post-pandemic workforce: An agenda for jobs. The panel explored the new models of education and skilling that are required to equip the present and future workforces and look to best practices among the BRICS nations that can be further adapted and adopted. The session also laid emphasis on how the future of work can be made more inclusive, ensuring 20th-century inequities are not replicated in the 21st century.

## Preparing for India's G20 Presidency T20 Should have Greater Representation from the Developing World: Researchers

The Think20 - one of the important Engagement Groups of the G20 comprising the 20 leading global economies - should have greater representation from developing country think-tanks, and must bring out their policy recommendations on global governance issues well in time for the G20 leaders to analyse and incorporate them in their final Declaration, according to researchers from across the world. This assumes importance as major developing countries Indonesia, India, Brazil and South Africa are slated to assume G20 Presidency in 2022, 2023, 2024 and 2025, respectively. The expectation is that the development agenda will now be at the front and centre of the discussions by G20 and its Engagement Groups, including Business 20, Think 20, Women 20, Youth20, Labour 20, Urban 20, Civil 20 and Science 20. There are now calls for greater representation and voice from developing economies to make the processes more inclusive.

Speaking at a virtual Brainstorming Session on 'T20 Reforms for Upcoming G20 Developing Country Presidencies' organized by the RIS on 24 November 2021, Professor Bambang Brodjonegoro, lead Co-Chair, T20 Indonesia and former Minister of Finance of Indonesia, said Indonesia is looking to ensure proportionate representation from all the continent and countries of all income groups. He added that issues such as cooperation in international taxation, infrastructure financing, SDGs, digitalization and revival of multilateralism are of great importance to developing and developed countries, and therefore should be accorded continuity in the T20 process for their effective implementation by the G20 Members. He said issues such as poverty and income inequality as well as sustainable financing of the Sustainable Development Agenda will be given priority during the Indonesian G20 Presidency.

Professor Djisman Simandjuntak, lead Co-Chair, T20 Indonesia, said with a view to get innovative policy ideas,

Indonesia will be reaching out to African think-tanks and will consider Policy Briefs from think-tanks and researchers who have not had the chance to participate in the T20 process so far. Ms Elizabeth Sidiropoulos, Chief Executive, the South African Institute of International Affairs, South Africa, mentioned about 'T20 Africa Standing Group' as important interlocutor and part of the T20 process from now on. Ms Anita Prakash, Senior Policy Advisor (Int. Economic Relations), ERIA, Jakarta, briefed the participants about the newly launched the G20 Research Forum by ERIA, RIS and 'LPEM-FEB IU' of Indonesia to collate ideas from various think-tanks and researchers on global governance issues. Dr Imme Scholz, Deputy Director, German Development Institute (DIE), Germany, referred to the way T20 Germany was organised and some tips to Indonesia and India. She also mentioned that Germany going to hold the G7 Presidency in 2022 and sought a mechanism for close collaboration with Indonesia (G20 Presidency for 2022) on various issues. She said this G7-G20 (and their Engagement Groups) coordination mechanism should be made applicable to all G20 events.

## Celebrating 75 years of India's Development Cooperation Special Week of Azadi Ka Amrit Mahotsav (AKAM) at RIS Exhibition on 75 Years of Development Partnership – Saga o

Exhibition on 75 Years of Development Partnership – Saga of Commitment to Plurality, Diversity and Collective Progress

India is a world leader in 'development cooperation' as the country's support to the Global South through technology transfer, capacity building, humanitarian aid as well as financial assistance is unconditional and in the spirit of the Vedantic mantra '*Vasudhaiva Kutumbakam*' ('the world is one family'), according to the Hon'ble Minister of State for External Affairs and Culture of India, Smt Meenakshi Lekhi speaking at a special programme held on 21 February 2022 to mark the celebration of Azadi Ka Amrit Mahotsav (AKAM).

RIS brought out a report as part of the AKAM programme of MEA on India's development cooperation initiatives during the last 75 years. A week-long exhibition on the same theme began after the event held to commemorate 75 years of Independence and befittingly celebrate the Azadi Ka Amrit Mahotsav.

The Minister said at the launch of the report that "We (India) are a (global) leader in that sense (in development cooperation), but we are reluctant in claiming that space. The goodness (of India) and the help that we have provided including during the time of the COVID-19 pandemic through vaccination and medical support, and which is being celebrated through this exhibition, can never be monetized," the Minister said.

Speaking on the occasion, Dr Mohan Kumar, Chairman, RIS, said India's development cooperation is based on the priorities of the recipient countries and is completely demand driven. Professor Sachin Chaturvedi, Director General, RIS, said the RIS painstakingly compiled information from 1947 to 2022 from the annual reports of all the ministries, adding that India's assistance was not only in terms of money, but also in the form of concepts such as 'Southern Collective', 'Climate Justice', 'illicit financial flows', 'Technology Facilitation Mechanism', 'Peace Keeping Forces' and 'LIFE' (Lifestyle for the Environment) as stated by Prime Minister Narendra Modi to help the world attain net-zero status to combat climate change. Prof Chaturvedi also said

India helped set up international institutions such as the International Solar Alliance and Coalition for Disaster Resilient Infrastructure. The country also set up the India Aid Mission in Nepal in 1952 and then decided to rename it Indian Cooperation Mission as it was felt that the principle of giving should be based on development cooperation instead of using the approach of aid.

According to the RIS report, the duty foregone by India for granting the poor countries access to Indian markets was to the tune of \$7 billion. The in-kind assistance provided by India, including through the distribution of farm equipment, during the period under review was also found to be \$7 billion. Incidentally, the RIS houses the Forum for Indian Development Cooperation (FIDC), which is a dedicated forum for exploring various facets of development cooperation, seeking to draw upon India's own experience in the backdrop of the international development cooperation scenario. It is a tripartite initiative of the Development Partnership Administration of the MEA, academia and civil society organisations.

At the outset, Minister emphasised that report would be useful during India's official engagements with other countries. There is a need to make all these information available in the public domain to help ensure that transparency in the process.

- The quantum of development assistance provided by India from 1947 to 2022 is to the tune of \$127 billion.
- Trained 350,000 people from other nations in the developing world through several initiatives including the Indian Technical and Economic Cooperation Programme (ITEC).
- The Lines of Credit provided by India is close to \$31 billion, and about half of it was to the neighboring countries.
- After the COVID-19 outbreak, India has provided vaccines to over 90 countries and \$4 billion in aid and grant to around 100 countries.

#### **RIS work programme**

Hon'ble Minister of State for External Affairs Applauds RIS Work Programme and Calls for Deeper Policy Connect



Hon'ble Minister of State for External Affairs and Culture, India, Smt. Meenakshi Lekhi, visited RIS on 30 December 2021 for an interactive session with faculty about the work programme of RIS. In the intensive session, Professor Sachin Chaturvedi, Director General, RIS, briefed the Hon'ble Minister about the history and organisational structure of the institution, thrust areas, research pillars, partnership platforms, global networks, publications and capacity building programmes. Faculty members briefed the Hon'ble Minister about their research profiles and activities covering international trade; India's economic relations with Latin America; narrative for rule-based Indo-Pacific, India-EU connectivity partnership and development; Blue Economy prospects in the Indian Ocean; multilateralism with special focus on UN SDGs, South-South and Triangular Cooperation; Science Policy and Science Diplomacy and India and Central Asia partnership for regional development. The Hon'ble Minister interacted with all faculty members and applauded the efforts of RIS in the above areas to serve as a think tank of developing countries. She encouraged all faculty members to engage in evidence based and policy relevant research, to undertake rigorous analysis and to embed national interest as well as connect with Indian thought and culture in our collective intellectual endeavours.

## Cooperation with the Asian region Advancing India-Australia-Pacific Islands Development Cooperation

Following the 2021 publication of "Advancing South-South Cooperation: India's Development Partnerships with Pacific Island Countries" from the Asian Foundation and RIS and supported by the Australian Department of Foreign Affairs and Trade (DFAT), a consultation webinar on 'Advancing India-Australia-Pacific Islands Development Cooperation' was held on 31 March 2022. Speakers from India, Australia, and the

PICs discussed and explored the history and prospects for India-PICs partnership and points of convergence between Australia's and India's interests in the PICs. The webinar provided an opportunity for articulating priorities. It was underlined that more studies should be conducted to analyze the prospects for triangular cooperation in different areas.

# Research Capacity Building Programme on Sustainable Development Goals

Effective implementation of Agenda 2030, for realisation of Sustainable Development Goals, is an integral part of RIS work programme. As part of this, the first phase of two week Research Capacity Building Programme on Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) was conducted under the flagship of RIS and North East Training, Research and Advocacy Foundation (NETRA) for young north eastern research scholars during 14-18 March, 2022 at RIS, New Delhi. Total 15 research scholars joined the programme from eight different north eastern states.

Dr Rajesh Tandon, Chairman of FIDC and President of PRIA, in his inaugural speech, discussed about the Localization of SDGs: Perspectives from North Eastern States of India. He emphasized that the vision of SDG can be fulfilled when one can connect with the indigenous people and work with them to amalgamate the indigenous knowledge and the modern technique by keeping originality and nature safe to become compatible with each other. He urged the participants to contribute their research work to the people or to the community they belong.

Professor Milindo Chakraborty, Visiting Fellow, RIS commenced the programme by a short addressing speech on Sustainable Development Goals and by pronouncing the significance of two Weeks Research Capacity Building Programme on Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs). He also mentioned the importance of collaboration of RIS and NETRA and how they will work hand in hand to bring or to achieve all the 17 SDGs in north eastern states of India. In his presentation, Professor Chakraborty also raised the issues of localizing SDGs in North East India.

Dr Rajkumar Ranjan Singh, Hon'ble Minister of State for External Affairs also interacted with the participants. He listened to the queries and suggestions provided by the participants to attain SDGs in north east India. While addressing he pointed out that SDGs should be achieved by integrating the local knowledge and practices with modern knowledge without harming the originality of the region. Professor S. K Mohanty, Senior Professor, RIS and Dr Sumit Seth, Joint Secretary, Policy Planning and Research, Ministry of External Affairs, also joined during the interaction.

While interacting with SDG-research scholars, Dr Rajeev Kumar, Vice-Chairman of NITI Aayog urged all the participants to go to the ground level and find out the real facts and data about the north east region of the country. He also asked to connect with the local people and try to understand the need of the local people which will help different policymakers to frame suitable policies for the local people.

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#### Global Economic Governance and Cooperation

Professor Sachin Chaturvedi, Director General, RIS, discussed the India's Development Cooperation: A Cross Border Spectrum by in relation to 17 SDGs. He pointed out that a researcher needs to find basic problems that are existed in their region and try to find out the best possible alternatives which suited them. He emphasised the need of investigating potential solutions to local community issues and more importantly, determining the root causes of such issues.

Among the speakers, Mr Shubomoy Bhattacharya, Fellow RIS, discussed on Energy Security (SDG-7) and the essentiality to understand the risk and benefit factor of the energy transition from conventional to renewable energy sources. He further pointed out the need for identification of the alternatives specific to North eastern region.

Dr Priyadarshi Dash, Associate Professor, RIS, enlightened the participants about different aspects of the Financing SDGs. The importance of effectively mobilizing domestic and foreign resources was further stressed upon by him.

By addressing the issues in sustainable health for all (SDG-3), Professor T.C. James, RIS and President of NIPO, very well explained about the terms health, health for all and sustainable healthcare. In his presentation, he emphasized that the political commitment, community participation and support of health related sectors are the requisites of sustainable health for all.

Dr Purva, Sr. Researcher, NIUA, in her delivery, pointed out that it is not simple to align all the goals and objectives to the global framework therefore, we need to get down at the city level (SDG-11) and develop these indicators and understand what are those indicators.

Professor Amitabh Kundu, RIS, brought out how SDG11 questions the present structure of urbanization, as in the present settlement hierarchy, everything is concentrated in big cities, which is one major issue discussed in the framework. He emphasized on the need to have an urban migration strategy and settlement strategy that we have to have a settlement structure that can integrate the whole region.

Expatiating on Gender Equality, SDG5, Dr Beena Pandey, RIS, asserted that the women empowerment is the precondition to achieve the targets of several other SDGs like poverty eradication, inequality, access to good health and education for all, decent work and economic growth among others.

Dr Kaustuv Bandyopadhyay, Director of PRIA, highlighted the roles played by a Civil Society organization in a community or a nation. The CSOs help reach the services meant for the marginalized and underprivileged. He underlined the reason for having partnerships and the factors contributing to a successful partnership, including having relatively equivalent power organizations, clearly defined organizational structure, and capacity enhancement of all the partners to work with each other.

Dr Jayanta Choudhury, Asst. Professor, Tripura University, Founder of NETRA, discussed how to localize SDGs in North East India. Dr Choudhury emphasized on importance of capacity building of different stakeholders, strengthening of existing local level institutes in the North East India. He also put the importance of CSOs at different levels to achieve the SDGs by 2030.

All the participants also participated in International discussion on Indigenous People and India organized by RIS. At the end of the programme, participants presented their thoughts on issues related to north East India under the mentorship of Professor Kesang Degi, Board Member of NETRA and Professor, Department of Education, RGU, Arunachal Pradesh. The next phase of programme will be conducted in the month of April at Regional Centre, IGNTU, Manipur.

#### **Evolving Strategic Architecture in Indo-Pacific: Perspectives** from India and ASEAN

Webinar- I to Celebrate Thirty Years of ASEAN-India Relations was held on February 18, 2022, on the theme of 'Evolving Strategic Architecture in Indo-Pacific: Perspectives from India and ASEAN' on virtual format. Special remarks were given by H.E. Mr Ung Sean, Ambassador, Royal Embassy of Cambodia, New Delhi and Amb. Jayant N. Khobragade, Indian Ambassador to ASEAN, Indian Mission to ASEAN, Jakarta. Professor Sachin Chaturvedi, Director-General, RIS, New Delhi ,extended the opening remarks. India's Indo-Pacific Oceans Initiative and ASEAN Outlook on Indo-Pacific are two important guiding principles for the peace and security in the Indo-Pacific. Indo-Pacific is much discussed in the recent academic and policy discourses and that explains its relevance for India's foreign policy formulation. India's recent initiatives in the Indo-Pacific exemplify its position for peaceful resolution of disputes and sustainability of development. Indo-Pacific is also important in international affairs as it symbolizes post-Cold war era features and demonstrates the relevance of plurilateral constructivism. ### **Building Post COVID-19 Economic Resilience in Asia and Pacific**

Panel Discussion on "Building Post COVID-19 Economic Resilience in Asia and Pacific", was held on 29 July, 2021. The programme started with the welcome remarks by Professor Sachin Chaturvedi, Director General, RIS. The panelists were: Dr Sweta Sexena, Chief, Macroeconomics Policy and Analysis, UNESCAP; Professor Ram Upendra Das, Head and Professor, Centre for Regional Trade and Mr Rajan Sudesh Ratna, Economic Affairs Officer, ESCAP-SSWA. The discussion featured policy dialogue on promoting economic resilience and the 2030 Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) in the region during the post-COVID-19 recovery. The panelists addressed issues pertaining to resilient economic recovery, financing challenges and climate-related sovereign risk management in Asia and the Pacific in general and India in particular. There was also a Q&A session. Dr Pankaj Vashisht, Associate Professor, RIS, extended the vote of thanks.

### Celebrating Thirty Years of ASEAN-India Relations – 'Evolving Strategic Architecture in Indo-Pacific: Perspectives from India and ASEAN

The year 2022 is marked as the ASEAN-India Friendship Year to commemorate the 30 years of dialogue relations that began in the early 1990s. To commemorate the 30 years of ASEAN-India dialogue relations, RIS is organising webinars in virtual mode to focus on the persistent challenges and emerging opportunities in ASEAN-India relations. RIS will organise five webinars on five thematic areas of the ASEAN-India relations throughout the year. To start with, the first webinar on strategic pillar of the ASEAN-India relations was organised virtually on Evolving Strategic Architecture in Indo-Pacific: Perspectives from India and ASEAN on 18 February 2022. Dr Prabir De, Professor and Coordinator, ASEAN-India Centre (AIC), RIS gave the welcome remarks. Professor Sachin Chaturvedi, Director General, RIS, delivered the opening remarks. H.E. Mr Ung Sean, Ambassador, Royal Embassy of Cambodia and Amb. Jayant N. Khobragade, Indian Ambassador to ASEAN, Indian Mission to ASEAN,

Jakarta delivered the special remarks. The panel discussion was chaired by Ambassador Rajiv Bhatia, Distinguished Fellow, Gateway House, Mumbai, and the following were the speakers:

Ms Joanne Lin, Lead Researcher, ASEAN Studies Centre, ISEAS Yusof-Ishak Institute, Singapore; Professor Rajaram Panda, Senior Fellow, Nehru Memorial Museum and Library (NMML), New Delhi; Mr Waffa Kharisma, Researcher, Department of International Relations Centre of Strategic and International Studies (CSIS), Jakarta and Dr Lawrence Prabhakar Williams, Professor, International Relations, Department of Political Science, Madras Christian College, Chennai. Dr Sampa Kundu, Consultant, ASEAN-India Centre (AIC), RIS gave the vote of thanks.

#### **Enabling the Global Energy Transition: India in the World**

The 41st STIP Forum Lecture was delivered by Dr Ajay Mathur, Director General, International Solar Alliance, on 28 February 2022 via an online platform. The topic of this public lecture was "Enabling the Global Energy Transition: India in the World". The event was chaired by Dr Vibha Dhawan, Director General, TERI. Welcome remark was delivered by Dr Bhaskar Balakrishnan, Science Diplomacy, RIS, followed by brief remarks by Mr Sunit Tandon, Director, India Habitat Centre.

In his very insightful address, Dr Ajay Mathur provided an overview of the energy transitions happening in the

world and in India. He began his lecture by highlighting that the renewable energy and non-fossil fuels have taken up a substantial share of the electricity generation mix. Globally, the share of renewable energy stands at 31 per cent, while in India, it's at 36 per cent. For India, it's almost like achieving the related Paris Agreement target well in advance. Dr Mathur elaborated on the key driving factors behind such significant transitions in the short period of time. One of the key drivers has been the significant decline in the prices of renewable energy. Other key driver has been the decline in the cost of the battery energy storage. He also highlighted that the global investments in renewable energy have increased substantially and so have the installed capacities.

Dr Mathur enumerated two key public policy interventions that helped India scale up its Solar energy installation till date viz. Price reduction and demand

creation. Price reduction has been achieved through a two-stage process comprising of Feed-in Tariffs and Reverse Auctions, whereas demand creation was achieved through the system of Renewable Purchase Obligations (RPOs). These policy instruments have made renewable energy cost effective and competitive, thus spurring their high intake. However, as mentioned by Dr Mathur, India's trade balance in terms of solar cells and solar modules is extremely skewed at this moment, wherein only 36 per cent of the solar panels installed in India during the FY 2021 were supplied by the domestic manufactures. Another challenge, as pointed by Dr Mathur, is in terms of the cost of capital for solar energy projects, which is quite high in India as compared to many other countries such as US, China and Europe. He placed high hopes on the recently launched PLI scheme to change this scenario in near future.

## **Resource of Multilateralism**

Multilateralism received a new lease of life, particularly WTO, following a change in the political regime in the US administration assuming the office of President Biden in 2021. The continued impasse in the WTO started moving towards a vibrant institution again to meet the growing aspirations of its member countries with the appointment of new leadership in the WTO. Recent practices of plurilateralism and the Joint Statement Initiative (JSI) have stranded the age-old practices of arriving at a consensus on different issues in the WTO. Persistent opposition to certain agreements or narrowing down of the scope of some Agreements in the WTO, such as food stockholding, TRIPS waiver for public health, etc. has weakened the trust of member countries in WTO as a credible, efficient and transparent rulemaking multilateral body. This has led to the proliferation of regionalism in various forms in different parts of the world. The world economy witnessed a wide area of regional grouping ranging from 20<sup>th</sup>-century RTAs to 21<sup>st</sup>-century regional eases. The rapid proliferation of regional groupings is not only observed in the global economy but also in India, which is currently witnessing its 'second wave' of regionalism since 2021.

To commemorate the launching of the WTO Ministerial Conference MC12, RIS brought out its flagship report of the 'World Trade and Development Report' in a programme on issues before WTO MC-12: Launch of WTDR (WTDR) on 25 November 2021 at New Delhi. The report presented a critical overview of the global regime, which focused on the intricacies between technology and development nexus existing in the global trade order. Several other issues, such as digitisation of trade, the resurgence of production activities in health equipment during the period of COVID-19, multilateral discussion on TRIPS in the context of COVID-19 Vaccines, fishery subsidy, SNDT provisions for developing countries, LDCs and SIDS, global trade in merchandise goods and services, WTO reforms and required changes in the global governance architecture to reform WTO, etc. are discussed from the perspective of developing countries. The WTDR launching was followed by a panel discussion. The participants were Professor Sachin Chaturvedi, Director-General, RIS, Ambassador Mohan Kumar, Chairman, RIS; Ambassador Jayant Dasgupta, Former Indian Ambassador to WTO; Shri Shyamal Mishra, Joint Secretary, Department of Commerce; Professor Ashwani Mahajan, National Co-convener, Swadeshi Jagaran Manch; Professor Abhijit Das, Head, Centre for WTO Studies, IIFT; Professor Nisha Taneja, ICRIES; Professor S K Mohanty, RIS; Dr Priyadarshi Das, Associate Professor, RIS; Dr Sabyasachi Saha, Associate Professor, RIS and Dr Pankhuri

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Gaur, Assistant Professor, RIS. The discussion panel expressed a successful conclusion of the fishery subsidy issue, which was pending before the DDA in 2001.

WTO Ministerial Conference (MC-12) was scheduled to be held on 30 November-3 December 2021 but was rescheduled to take place from 12 to 17 June 2022 due to the spread of Omicron across the globe. RIS organised an online panel discussion to consolidate and protect the economic interest of developing countries by staying united and adhering to common principles while negotiating in the WTO on various issues, having interest for developing countries. In the discussion, the participating panellists were Carlos Correa, Executive Director, South Centre, Ambassador Jayant Dasgupta, Ambassador Mohan Kumar, Professor Sachin Chaturvedi, Dr Nagesh Kumar and Dr Pankhuri Gaur. The discussion was broadly on strengthening the positions of developing countries in certain critical issues such as fishery subsidy (FS), agricultural subsidy, TRIPS waiver, and SNDT.

#### Long Pending Issue on Fishery Subsidy

The stalemate continued to prevail in the multilateral discussions for the last two decades on the Fishery Subsidy Agreement. Since asymmetric practices of fishery subsidy continued between resource-poor and resource-rich countries, a balanced and just Fishery Subsidy Agreement is warranted for supporting the livelihood security issues of developing countries, particularly LDCs and SIDS. On the run-up to WTO Ministerial Conference, MC-12, initially scheduled from 30 November to 3 December 2021, a panel discussion on 'Fishery Subsidy and the Discussion at WTO: Issues, Prospects and Way Forward', was organised on 29 May 2021. The welcome remarks were delivered by Professor Sachin Chaturvedi and the session was chaired by Mr Rajeev Kher, Distinguish Fellow, RIS. Various aspects of fishery subsidy including India's official position on the issue, technical interpretation of the 'May Draft', the socio-economic impact of fishery subsidy and positions taken by fishery workers in India, were discussed by a panel comprised Dr Tarun Sridran, Mr Mukesh Bhatnagar, Professor S.K. Mohanty, Ms Ranja Sengupta and Mr Jayaprakash. The discussion also covered a wide range of micro-management issues, which included appropriate provisions in the Special Differential Treatment (SNDT) mechanism for LDCs and SIDC, subsidy-related issues to IUU fishing, subsidy within the 12 nautical territorial water, etc. After the conclusion of WTO MC-12 in June 2022, the fishery subsidy issue remained inconclusive. The matter is further shifted to the next ministerial conference of WTO.

#### **Dealing with Regionalism**

In the regional approach to regionalism, India has been accorded priority on regionalism/bilateralism over the last two decades. In the recent free trade Agreements, the negotiating countries have been consistently making efforts to include new provisions in the agreement, which are almost consistent with the 21<sup>st</sup>-century Agreements. India's regionalism approach has been to sign new Agreements and upgrade the existing Agreements through the review process. RIS has opened up such dialogues with some countries to consolidate bilateral economic relations. RIS, in collaboration with ICWA and KNDA (Korean National Diplomatic Academy and Korean Institute for International Economic Policy (KIEP) organised the first "India-Korea 2+2 Bilateral Dialogue on 'Reimaging India-Korea Relations in the Emerging Regional Order: For synergising the 'Act East Policy' and the 'New Southern Policy',

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a webinar was organised on 27 October 2021. Resource persons from think tanks participated in the day-long discussion from both countries. Discussions were focused on various issues, including bilateral economic relations in the changing global order, response to the post-COVID situation, and strategic dimensions in the Indo-Pacific region among others.

RIS organised another webinar with Chung-Hua Institute for Economic Research (CIER) on "Developing GVCs in India: Scaling up Taiwan's Investment to India", on 9th December 2021. Participating resource persons from both think tanks discussed wide-ranging issues, including bilateral engagement in semiconductor production and value chains sectors, India's vision on ICT as well as semi-conductor sectors, India-Taiwan cooperation in the technology industry, the role of G2G engagement in promoting the technology industry, response to COVID-19 in a state of global economic crisis and developing close economic partnership in trade and investment.

In collaboration with the Nigerian Army Resource Centre (NARC), RIS also hosted a webinar on "Promoting MSME to Enhance Industrialisation: Challenges and Prospects" on 14th July 2021. The webinar was addressed by Professor Sachin Chaturvedi, Director-General, RIS, HE Mr Abhay Thakur, Major General (Retired) Mr Garba Ayodeji Wahab, Director General, NARC, Professor S.K. Mohanty, RIS, Professor M.H. Bala Subramanya, IIS, Mr Joseph Olatayo Omidiji, NEXIM Bank, Mr Adeyemi Folorunsho, Manufacturing Association of Nigeria and Dr Pankaj Vashisht, RIS. The webinar deliberated on the state of MSME in both countries and the need for cooperation to develop the sector.

# Time to Revisit Mechanisms for Financial Cooperation

The COVID-19 pandemic, followed by Russia-Ukraine conflict, has changed the global financial landscape in the last three years. It was marked by an abrupt reversal of capital flows, drying of new investments due to 'save home first' preoccupations, squeezed fiscal space, mounting debt service burden, higher demand for social safety programmes, rising prices, and reluctance among the private investors. Falling tax revenues due to low economic activity as a result of prolonged lock-downs and higher spending on the health sector. Developing countries and LDCs faced the worst as budgetary constraints narrowed the scale of their policy interventions to deal with growing poverty, job losses and reverse migration. Although the size of fiscal stimulus differed across economies, it was the only option before countries to support the economy in transition from COVID-19. Job losses in informal sectors worsened socio-economic conditions and put pressure on the exchequer for comprehensive social safety arrangements.

Banks and financial institutions played a key role during the pandemic by sustaining credit flows to the productive sectors as well as household consumption. Loan moratorium and restructuring of debt were opted as a relief to the affected population. Digital platforms and Fintech solutions were instrumental in facilitating numerous retail transactions during lock-downs, and enabling governments to make faster and transparent direct benefit transfers to millions of beneficiaries. The Government of India successfully leveraged digital platforms in a seamless way to transfer the COVID package to all Jan Dhan account holders.

While fiscal space eroded significantly during the pandemic, the debt servicing burden for many countries led to substantial deterioration of their balance of payments situation. IMF crisis financing appeared the only option for them, whereas Debt Service Suspension Initiative (DSSI) offered some relief temporarily. As it is going on for some time, IMF also tries to raise its crisis finding window. In fact, two days back, IMF announced the Resilience and Sustainability Trust, which would very soon operationalise the Resilience and Sustainability Facility (RSF) for the eligible countries. Besides the IMF as the lender of last resort time has come to strengthen financial cooperation through regional financial arrangements or similar arrangements between countries.

Having demonstrated its contribution to the field of trade, investment, technology and regional economic integration, RIS has a dedicated pillar for research and policy advice on financial cooperation, infrastructure finance, SDG financing and development finance. The finance team at RIS has recently contributed a number of policy briefs to Think 20 (T20) in the areas of innovative financing for infrastructure, blended finance for SDGs, debt management frameworks, among others.

For comprehensive debate on banks, financial institutions and financial systems, RIS, in collaboration with India International Centre (IIC) launched a webinar series in 2021. In total, six webinars (three in the financial year 2020-21 and three in financial year 2021-22) were organised on different topics as part of this series. Several notable experts deliberated on contemporary issues at length. The webinar on "Banks, Finance and Changing Forms of Technology: New Options with Fintech" held on April 23, 2021, covered the application of a range of fintech solutions in digital banking, digital lending, retail payments, etc. The webinar identified several promising areas of fintech applications such as financial inclusion, SME lending, etc. A dedicated session on "Role of Banking and Financial Sector: Overcoming Pandemic Challenges" chaired by Ms Usha Thorat, Former Governor, Reserve Bank of India delved into the timely action taken by the banks during the pandemic in the form of credit, deferment of loan repayments, and working capital support to MSME sectors. The last in the series focused on a lecture on "Resilient Financial System and Governance" by Mr Mahesh Kumar Jain, Deputy Governor, Reserve Bank of India. The seminar focused on emerging technologies, risk management frameworks and evolving governance structures. Dr Rakesh Mohan, Former Deputy Governor, Reserve Bank of India and President, Centre for Social and Economic Progress (CSEP) chaired and shared his insights on the subject. The deliberations of the webinar series have appeared in the form of outcome documents.

Besides the above mentioned activities undertaken last year, a number of research studies relating to the finance domain are current at different stages. RIS is undertaking a study on fintech in collaboration with University of Essex, UK, along with ISID, New Delhi and GIFT, Thiruvananthapuram. Research papers in the pipeline include fintech corridors, green finance, etc.

# Fishery Subsidy and the Discussions at WTO: Issues, Prospects and Way Forward

Ahead of the WTO's July 15 deadline for its member countries to come up with a 'clean and complete' fisheries negotiation text to be presented to trade ministers to help them reach an agreement, experts asked developing countries, including India, to ensure that the interests of low-income and resource-poor fisherfolk are protected.

Speaking at a webinar on 'Fishery Subsidy and the Discussions at the WTO: Issues, Prospects and Way Forward' held on 29 May 2021, Dr Mukesh Bhatnagar, Professor, Centre for WTO Studies, Indian Institute of Foreign Trade, said India is aiming to use the Special and Differential Treatment (SDT) mechanism to make sure that low income, resource-poor fishers, or livelihood fishing, as well as fishing-related activities of developing countries in their respective territorial waters (12 nautical miles from the shores of the coastal state) are protected through an exemption from the ban on subsidies for unreported and unregulated fishing.

A recent draft text put out by the WTO Chair of the negotiations, has proposed a two-year time period (from the date when the final agreement enters into force) for developing countries, including LDCs, to do away with the exemption from subsidies for Illegal, Unreported and Unregulated (IUU) fishing (for fishing-related activities of their poor fishers) within 12 nautical miles from the baseline.

According to the draft text, two years as the applicable time period can be a starting point for discussing this provision. However, experts said there are many points (including those related to this timeline for exemption from the ban on subsidies as well as the definition of what constitutes 'artisanal fishing') in the draft text that are yet to be agreed upon by the members. As per the WTO, "under the mandate from the WTO's 11th Ministerial Conference held in Buenos Aires in 2017 and the UN Sustainable Development Goal (SDG) Target 14.6, negotiators have been given the task of securing agreement on disciplines to eliminate subsidies for IUU fishing and to prohibit certain forms of fisheries subsidies that contribute to overcapacity and overfishing, with SDT being an integral part of the negotiations."

Mr Tarun Sridhar, former Secretary, the Department of Animal Husbandry, Dairying and Fisheries, said it is questionable whether the WTO was the appropriate body for fisheries negotiation, especially on issues like what constitutes 'overfishing', when there are other specialised agencies for that purpose such as the Food and Agriculture Organization of the United Nations. WTO primarily looks at the issue of tariffs, he added. He also said developing countries, including India have capacity constraints in complying with various notifications and in taking part in the negotiations effectively. There are the practical difficulties in implementation of norms, such as determining whether a small fishing boat has crossed the 12 nautical mile distance limit for fishing.

Professor S. K. Mohanty, RIS, proposed certain alternatives with greater flexibilities for developing countries. For instance, he said there could be a complete exemption for LDCs from the ban on providing subsidies for small scale fishing within the 12 nautical mile distance limit, and a longer time period for developing countries (say 7-10 years) to end such subsidies. Ms Ranja Sengupta, Senior Researcher, Third World Network, said there are attempts by developed countries to cripple the SDT mechanism meant for developing countries, even though the UN SDG Target 14.6 comes with a SDT mandate (it specifies that 'by 2020, members should prohibit certain forms of fisheries subsidies which contribute to overcapacity and overfishing; eliminate subsidies that contribute to IUU fishing and refrain from introducing new such subsidies, recognizing that appropriate and effective SDT for developing countries and LDCs should be an integral part of the WTO fisheries subsidies negotiation).

Mr P. Jayaprakash, Akhil Bharatiya Matsya Mazdoor Mahasangh, termed as "undemocratic" the "hasty" manner in which the WTO was conducting negotiations in a virtual format "without adequate transparency", and "pushing" countries to conclude the negotiations soon, especially at a time when developing countries are finding it difficult to overcome the health crisis due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

Professor Sachin Chaturvedi, Director General, RIS, said the fisheries negotiations are important from the perspective of the usage of SDT provisions and the WTO's governance of subsidies. Mr Rajeev Kher, Distinguished Fellow, RIS and former Commerce Secretary of India, said the fisheries negotiation gives the WTO an opportunity to revive multilateralism.

# Role of Banking and Financial Sector: Overcoming Pandemic Challenges

The RBI in its upcoming June monetary policy will be faced with a "huge challenge" of doing a tightrope balancing act between growth and inflation, especially in view of Wholesale Price Index (WPI)-based inflation and core WPI inflation inching up as well as due to the need to maintain price stability with an eye on growth, according to former RBI Deputy Governor, Ms Usha Thorat.

Speaking at a webinar on the 'Role of Banking and Financial Sector: Overcoming Pandemic Challenges' organised by RIS and India International Centre on 21 May 2021, Ms Thorat said, "We are finding commodity prices pressure building up. We are finding that WPI and core inflation are inching up. We are also quite concerned about the impact of the (COVID-19) second wave and the supply and demand constraints that are being faced. So, I think this kind of a tight rope balancing will clearly come out in the next monetary policy deliberations (of the RBI)." In April, the WPI-based inflation had touched an 11-year high of 10.5 per cent as against 7.4 per cent in the previous month on account of the price rise of certain food products, fuels, minerals and manufactured items. However, the retailed inflation had dropped to a three-month low of 4.3 per cent in April.

She pointed out that earlier there was a stance towards going back from the accommodative stance to start withdrawing the excess liquidity in the system. But the last monetary policy talked about the concerns regarding growth, she said. Both GDP outlook and Consumer Price Index (CPI) come out in every monetary policy and will be looked upon very closely with the kind of information that RBI has. She said there is a need to have a relook at the fiscal space both at the Centre and the state government levels.

Speaking on the occasion, Professor Sachin Chaturvedi, Director General, RIS, and member, the Board of Governors, RBI, said the inflation target (of 4 per cent, with a leeway of +/- 2 percentage points) "would be a means towards the end, which is growth and development." He also referred to the RBI's recent announcement of a Rs 50,000 crore liquidity package to help boost the country's healthcare infrastructure and the efforts that the Ministry of Finance is making to bring down inflationary tendencies.

Mr Manish Sabharwal, Chairman, Board of Directors, Team Lease Services Ltd, said availability of credit is more important than the cost of credit. "There is really less dispute between the government and RBI (on addressing inflation). Inflation is a really important election issue in the long run. It is the biggest tax on the poor. This fight (between the government and the RBI) is overdone, that somebody likes inflation and somebody doesn't. Nobody likes inflation. It is only people who live in the weather of the moment who obsess about this," he said. Ms Dakshita Das, Additional Member, Railway Board and former, Managing Director, National Housing Bank and Mr Sangram Singh, EVP & Head (Commercial Banking Coverage Group), Axis Bank, touched upon the critical role that credit would play in the post-pandemic recovery, especially to the MSME sector and desired path of lending, the banks and NBFCs are expected to embark on.

# Asia's Post-Pandemic Order and Integration: Outlook of ASEAN and the Indo-Pacific at Crossroads

The ASEAN Studies Center (Chulalongkorn University), Bangkok; the Research Institute on Contemporary Southeast Asia (IRASEC-CNRS) in Bangkok, and the ASEAN-India Centre (AIC) at RIS in New Delhi organised an international conference on "Asia's Post-Pandemic Order and Integration: Outlook of ASEAN and the Indo-Pacific at Crossroads" on 8 - 9 July 2021 in virtual mode. The two-day conference had six technical sessions which covered - Southeast Asia between India and China Reimagining Asia and Regional Indo-Pacific Order; The Indo-Pacific from Southeast Asian Perspectives; Centrality and Multilateralism in Uncertain Times; Geopolitics in the Indo-Pacific: The Interesting Interests of Other Major Powers; Asia's Post-Pandemic Integration: What the Indo-Pacific Should Stand for?; ASEAN amidst Competing Connectivity Strategic and Integration Challenges; Security Issues and Strategic Challenges in the Indo-Pacific.

#### **Resilient Financial System and Governance**

Unless traditional financial firms adapt to the newer ways of doing business by adopting the latest technologies and showing technological resilience, they may be marginalised soon by the Big Tech and innovative FinTech players that are revolutionising financial transactions, according to Mr Mahesh Kumar Jain, Deputy Governor, RBI.

Speaking at a webinar on 'Resilient Financial System and Governance' jointly organised by RIS and India International Centre on 18 June 2021, Mr Jain said, "Technology is

revolutionising the competitive landscape of the financial system." He added that there is a "growing reliance of financial institutions on technology and technology resilience is now regarded as important as financial resilience, if not more important." However, Mr Jain underlined the importance of preserving heterogeneity in the financial system with entities following different business models, even while they adapt to the newer ways of doing business. "A homogenous financial system will be less resilient and prone to a systemic crisis if the underlying economic conditions change," he said.

Referring to the growing importance of climate risks, he said while insurance companies directly face such risks, banks are also required to take them more seriously. Mr Jain said the financial system needs to move towards green financing, even while taking into account the country's developmental requirements. RBI is discussing with central banks of other countries for developing guidelines on green finance.

Citing good governance framework as a major factor that enhances the resilience of an entity, he said governance quality depends on governance structures and culture. Mr Jain also highlighted the importance of compensation policies in the context of governance framework.

On the role of moral hazard, or its absence, in building a resilient financial system, Mr Jain said banks will not have any incentive to invest in building a robust risk management system if they know that taxpayers' money would be used to rescue them.

Speaking on the occasion, Dr Rakesh Mohan, former Deputy Governor, RBI and Distinguished Fellow, Centre for Social and Economic Progress, stressed on the need for RBI to keep a close watch on the actual level of

bad loans or the likely NPAs even as the current pandemictriggered crisis has necessitated regulatory forbearance/ loan moratorium. This will help in contingency planning for any situation once the regulatory forbearance/debt moratorium is lifted, he said. Dr Mohan also expressed concern over a likelihood of a flood of Insolvency and Bankruptcy Code-related cases in the near future.

Professor Sachin Chaturvedi, Director General, RIS, and Governing Board member, RBI, said the RBI has launched a programme called '*Utkarsh*' to bring in new initiatives on the regulatory side, and adopt new technologies. However, the challenges include the multiplicity of financial firms and FinTech, as well as the need to ensure a green recovery through greater access to green finance.

Ashok Bhattacharya, Executive Director, *Business Standard* Group, spoke about the need for greater clarity on the relationship between the government and the financial system as well as the importance of strengthening the apex level Financial Stability and Development Council to address interconnected issues in the financial sector. Mr N.N. Vohra, President, IIC, also spoke on the occasion.

# **Reviving Trade and Investment for Recovery: Focus on Resilience, Inclusion and Sustainability**

The third dialogue in the series was on Reviving Trade and Investment for Recovery: Focus on Resilience, Inclusion and Sustainability was held on 20 July 2021. Professor S K Mohanty, RIS, gave the welcome remarks. Professor Sachin Chaturvedi, Director-General, RIS gave the welcome remarks. H.E. Mr Abhay Thakur, High Commissioner of India to Nigeria made opening remarks. Major General (Retired) Mr Garba Ayodeji Wahab, Director General, Nigerian Army Resource Center, Nigeria gave special remarks. Session I was on MSME in India: Status, Challenges and Way forward and Session II was on MSME Sector in Nigeria. Eminent speakers included: Professor M. H. #### Agriculture and Food Systems in South Asia Demonstrated Unexpected Resilience

The programme was co-organized by IFPRI South Asia, Indian Council of Agricultural Research (ICAR) and RIS on 8 July 2021, to present the highlights of the *Global Food Policy Report*, 2021, in the South Asian context. Policy makers and thought leaders shared their perspectives on COVID-19's impacts on our food systems and discussed the lessons. The report draws from the current crisis to help transform food systems to reduce the ongoing impacts of the pandemic, better prepare for future shocks, and address longstanding weaknesses and inequalities.

"We have known for a while now that there are major problems with our food systems, that they are unequal and unsustainable," said Dr Johan Swinnen, Director General of IFPRI. "This crisis has revealed these problems in a way that none of us can ignore, but it has also demonstrated that we have effective ways to address these problems".

Dr P. K. Anand, Visiting Fellow, RIS, stated that UN Sustainable Development Goal 2 (pertaining to ending hunger and malnutrition by 2030) is a critical area that needs to be addressed. In the backdrop of the COVID-19 pandemic, the biggest contribution from India was that there were no starvation deaths despite the closure of borders, disruption of value chains and locust attacks. The record wheat procurement speaks volumes about our food system. He said important aspects that require great attention include reduction of carbon footprint, ensuring climate resilience, financing mechanisms, localization of efforts to provide nutritious food to people, and making sure that there are sufficient stocks of a variety of food items, including those like millets that can address issues of co-morbidities.

*"The Global Food Policy Report (GFPR) 2021* highlights that the countries in the region did much better than the expert predictions in terms of economic performance, food price stabilization, and protecting livelihoods. However, the report also cautioned that there's no room for complacency, which unfortunately turned out to be true during the second wave that overwhelmed health systems and significantly disrupted livelihoods", said Dr Shahidur Rashid, Director- IFPRI, South Asia.

The report underscores that the pandemic has revealed both resilience and vulnerabilities in South Asian food systems. Across the region, the agriculture sector grew, food prices remained relatively stable, and no food security crisis was reported during the first wave. This resilience can largely be attributed to the region's decades investments in infrastructure and institutions for social transfers and safety nets programmes, as well as the expansion of many of these programmes.

Surveys conducted by IFPRI found that public transfer systems for food, security, health, and nutrition have largely performed well in the region.

One of the key vulnerabilities that the pandemic illuminated is the fragility of many South Asian labor markets, especially in the non-farm and informal sectors, which are vital for both economic and food systems transformation. The strict lockdowns led to the return of many migrant laborers to their hometowns, creating a scarcity of labor in the agricultural sector and threatening nutrition and food security.

The report finds that South Asia's international remittance inflows also proved vulnerable. While the pandemic has raised new challenges, researchers stressed that we could not lose sight of old challenges standing in the way of an inclusive and sustainable food system transformation for the region.

Dr Rashid stated that agriculture and food systems in South Asia had demonstrated unexpected resilience in the face of the pandemic. However, the region cannot afford to be complacent because growth in the nonfarm and service sectors is an essential pre-condition for economic and food system transformation and COVID-19 has reminded South Asia how vulnerable these sectors are. The eminent participants included Dr Trilochan Mohapatra, Dr Dushni Weerakoon, Dr Swarnim Waglé and Dr Binayak Sen among others.

#### **Postponement of MC12 Leaves Scope for More Work**

By the time this webinar took off, the postponement of MC12 due to Omicron spread was already announced. But speakers stressed that India should use postponement of WTO Ministerial to connect with Developing countries South. should analyse the impact of the postponement of the WTO Ministerial Conference (MC12) on the outcome of the

event and use the time till it is convened again to protect their interests by staying united and

consolidating their positions, according to international trade experts from the Global South. The decision on the postponement of the MC12 (slated for November 30-December 3, 2021) was taken late Friday by the WTO General Council "after an outbreak of a particularly transmissible strain of the COVID-19 virus."

Speaking at the webinar, Professor Carlos Correa, Executive Director, South Centre, Geneva, said the developing country think tanks like the South Centre and RIS should analyse all the proposals and ensure that the postponement of the MC12 will help consolidate developing country positions on various issues including fisheries subsidies, agriculture, TRIPS waiver and Special and Differential Treatment.

Referring to the WTDR's focus on how technology and trade are impacting each other, Prof Correa said this issue, though very important, especially in the post-COVID scenario that saw an acceleration of digitalization, has not been dealt with seriously at the WTO.

Dr Mohan Kumar, Chairman, RIS, said developing countries need to get their act together by looking at the opportunities and challenges that have emerged due to the postponement of MC12. Ensuring 'success of the MC12 at any cost' should not mean that 'success' is cornered by the developed world and developing countries are left to bear the 'costs', he said.

Ambassador Jayant Dasgupta, formerly India's Ambassador to WTO, said the postponement of the MC12 gives an opportunity to developing countries to prepare strongly to counter some proposals which are against their interests. He said developed countries will have to come clean on issues such as sustainability and gender, through which they have been indirectly trying to gain market access in the developing world.

Dr Nagesh Kumar, Director, Institute for Studies in Industrial Development (ISID), referred to the importance of the proposal on TRIPS waiver by India and South Africa and said that the WTO should demonstrate that protection of the lives of billions of poor people in the developing world is more important than the protection of the bottom line of a few MNCs that have developed COVID vaccines, diagnostic kits and drugs. He said the discussion on investment facilitation for development should ensure a balance in the rights and responsibilities of investors, home country and host country. He said major developing countries like India should be a part of the plurilaterals including on investment facilitation so that they can ensure that their outcome is not against developing country interests.

Professor Sachin Chaturvedi, Director General, RIS, said it is all the more important to strengthen developing country coalitions and ensure that the Global South remains as a cohesive unit on various MC12 issues, including on the Joint Statement Initiatives to ensure that they do not take away the policy space of developing country governments in taking decisions in the national interest. He said trade should be a catalyst for domestic production and domestic growth and not just for greater imports. India should use postponement of the WTO Ministerial to connect with the South.

Prof S. K. Mohanty and Dr Pankhuri Gaur of RIS presented the details of the *WTDR*, and Dr Sabyasachi Saha, RIS, also spoke on the occasion.

## Trade, Investment, Finance and Economic Cooperation Roundtable on India-Africa Relations in a Post-Pandemic World

RIS, in collaboration with University of Oslo, Norway organised a roundtable discussion on "India-Africa Relations in a Post-Pandemic World" in hybrid mode on 9 December 2021. The purpose of the roundtable was to examine the future of India-Africa relations spread across two sessions on overall foreign policy orientations and sectoral cooperation in the areas of health, IT, renewable energy, capacity building, traditional medicine, etc.

In his welcome remarks, Professor Sachin Chaturvedi, Director General, RIS highlighted the major milestones in India-Africa relations as well as recent trends in their development partnership. He noted that India is today more keen on timely implementation of development and infrastructure projects. Prime Minister Modi has taken initiative to monitoring the progress. He also suggested to set up India's development agency for facilitating development cooperation in Africa and other regions. Professor Dan Banik, University of Oslo, Norway, said that there is a big departure from India's past policy towards Africa. There are more high profile visits in recent times. Defence cooperation between India and Africa is also evolving. He noted that there is an element of shift from idealism to pragmatism in the Indian foreign policy.

In his special remarks, Shri Dammu Ravi, Secretary (ER), Ministry of External Affairs, India noted that

cooperation with Africa is always important for India. Underlining India's historical relations with Africa, Shri Ravi noted that currently New Delhi is widening its cooperation in health, renewable and IT- financial technology sectors. Apart from COVID vaccines, India provided medical assistance to African nations and is also ready to support them in the future as well. He opined that there is also scope for deepening India's relations with Africa in telemedicine. Trade is not up to mark with Africa. Today, Africa wants to make manufactured goods not just only export of the raw materials. Therefore, India would like to set up manufacturing zones there with support of African nations. Shri Ravi said that India is exploring prospects for tri-angular cooperation with France and Britain in Africa.

India-Africa cooperation in areas of health and fintech has been extensively explored in the roundtable discussion. Panellists also noted that agriculture sector also offers opportunities for cooperation between India and Africa.

It was also suggested that India should be cautious in developing cooperation with European nations in Africa because of their colonial rule. Panelists also noted that India's Africa policy should be de-continentalised because of the diversity in Africa.

#### "Developing GVCs in India: Scaling up Taiwan's Investment to India"

The COVID-19 pandemic exposed the vulnerability of global value chains (GVC) that compel the high labour force needs of industries, such as manufacturing industries to cease production. The effect of the epidemic was aggravated during phases of lockdown which induced recession across industrial sectors. This is even more harmful to developing countries, such as India whose GDP contracted by 7.3 per cent in 2020-21 as per the government estimates while the world grew by -3.41 per cent. Therefore, it is a considerable issue to further identify the sectors and possible physical zones of GVCs along with the increase of vaccine coverage and economic recovery.

Based on the long Supply Chains Collaboration of India and Taiwan on electronic components and products, the webinar on "Developing GVCs in India: Scaling up Taiwan's Investment to India," that took place on 9 December 2021 focussed primarily on the issue of Electronics, ICTs, and Semi-conductor sectors. The topics included (1) Taiwan's Experiences in Developing electronics and semi-conductors supply chains; (2) India's Visions and Current Developments of Electronics, ICT sectors, and Semi-Conductors industries; (3) India-Taiwan collaboration in technology industry supply chains – governments' roles and business perspectives. This will deepen the understanding between India and Taiwan on the technology and supply chain cooperation to deal with the U.S.-China trade war, COVID-19 pandemic and global economic turmoil. The increase in interaction between India and Taiwan, and the two countries becoming close trade partners in the future, would be beneficial for both sides.

### Food and Agricultural Trade in BIMSTEC

RIS-IFPRI National Partners' Meeting took place on 30 March 2022. The meeting addressed the significant problems raised by BIMSTEC in relation to regional competition, with a focus on agriculture. BIMSTEC has been and will continue to be a significant platform for encouraging regional cooperation among South Asian and South East Asian countries, however most BIMSTEC countries' agriculture sectors remain untapped. Food and agriculture trade has doubled Address was delivered by Ambassador Riva Ganguly Das, Secretary (East), Ministry of External Affairs (MEA), Government of India, New Delhi.

The two-day conference had five Plenary Sessions: (1) Maritime Security (2) Resource Sharing, (3) Science and Technology Cooperation, Pandemic and Disaster Risk Reduction and Management (4). The 5th EAS Conference on Maritime Security Cooperation discussed issues related to maritime security, information and resources sharing in the maritime domain, science and technology cooperation, disaster risk reduction and pandemic management and a panel discussion on way forward. Discussions reflected upon the importance of Indo-Pacific Ocean Initiative (IPOI) and its seven pillars that has the potential to strengthen India's pragmatic diplomacy in the region. IPOI is focused on better management of shared interests of the participating countries. There is an urgent need to facilitate convergences of national and regional interests in the Indo-Pacific and IPOI is suited for such a scenario.

in real terms since 1995, reaching 1.5 trillion in 2018. Surprisingly, emerging and developing countries account for a third of global trade. BIMSTEC will debate on the need for investment in infrastructure, particularly food processing, testing standards, marketing and logistical infrastructure. Food exports from BIMSTEC countries have risen. In 2019, it was 45.3 per cent of total merchandise exports in Nepal, reversing the previous trend. It will be the greatest

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achievement if this trend continues. BIMSTEC is pushing agriculture as a priority sector and working hard to see it grow. Trade facilitation, trade financing, cross-border payment settlement, and other variables can assist the food and agriculture sectors to flourish.

The participants deliberated on BIMSTEC linkages, partnerships and cooperation conceptual framework. Poverty and food insecurity due to economic shocks, climate change and interstate conflicts; rising poverty headcount ratio; unemployment and lower earnings due to economic recession are some of the challenges in BIMSTEC whereas natural resource abundance and trade and investment advantages are some of its strengths. Myanmar is the only BIMSTEC country leading in agriculture. India leads in tourism, transportation, disaster management, and counterterrorism. Similarly, each BIMSTEC country has leading sectors in Economic, Social, and Environmental Linkages (Integrated framework). Some of the areas of cooperation between BIMSTEC countries are - Implementation of a climate-friendly FTA and international collaboration on climate change goals, limitation of fossil fuel subsidies, reduction of tariff and non-tariff barriers on environmental goods and services, domestic policy required for trade and

investment gains, etc. The ultimate goal is to make evidence-based policy insights.

Although BIMSTEC's sectoral model differs from other regional agreements, it has been compared to ASEAN and SAARC. SAARC countries are also BIMSTEC members, therefore lessons from SAARC can be learned. Unlike in Nepal, where farmers are terribly disadvantaged and unheard, India's policies are centred on farmers. India offers interest-free loans to farmers. An agricultural trade deficit is alarming for a country that used to be a big rice exporter in the early 1970s. Bangladesh has made great strides in agriculture and is now food self-sufficient. Agriculture is a diverse industry with unique challenges. Value addition in agriculture is difficult. Also, agriculture cannot develop in isolation from trade and industry. The abolition of NTBs has been shown to enhance GDP by 1.6 per cent in some circumstances. Tariff liberalization is not complete without looking at other nations' tariff regimes. BIMSTEC countries can create an enabling environment by removing trade barriers and improving connectivity. BIMSTEC can contribute to food and nutrition security, farmer prosperity, employment creation, and poverty alleviation.

## Trade Facilitation, Connectivity and Regional Cooperation

## **Resource of Multilateralism**

The balance of power is having a transformation in the world. The emerging trend indicates a multipolar world with high geopolitical and economic influence of developing countries including India. To adjust with the new world order, countries in the South and the organisations such as the RIS have been repositioning through their work programmes on continuous basis. Improved connectivity promotes trade, production networks and people to people contacts. Connectivity matters for growth, supply chain efficiency and resilience. Trade facilitation, connectivity and regional cooperation is one such vertical in RIS that has been contributing to strengthen regional integration while promoting global

and regional development strategies.

In view of the post-pandemic scenario, RIS work programmes had covered wide spectrum of trade facilitation, connectivity and regional cooperation. Countries across the world have faced supply chain disruptions during the COVID-19 pandemic. The need for resiliency in connectivity and regional cooperation has therefore gained high importance. Today, countries witness enhanced global and regional economic integration driven by multitude of FTAs, improved digital connectivity and supply chain resiliency. RIS has been supporting the countries in the immediate and extended neighbouhood to cope up with the challenges posed by the pandemic through cooperation.

In sync with our global and regional priorities, we at the RIS look at connectivity as an important facilitator of development, within and beyond borders. Despite constraints in the pandemic time, the RIS continued to excel in 2021-22 in connectivity related activities through studies, conferences, dialogues, seminars, webinars, etc. and raised the voice and importance by writings and dissemination of cross-cutting global and regional issues. RIS research programmes cover a series of topics starting from trade and connectivity to culture and civilization to integration and cooperation. These can be clubbed into following types: first, high impact studies and specialized research inputs; second, conferences, seminars, dialogues and lecture series; and third, training and capacity building.

#### **Flagship Studies**

In 2021-22, the RIS came out with two flagship studies on connectivity and regional cooperation: (i) India-EU Connectivity Partnership for Development, Demand and Democracy; and (ii) Trilateral Highway and Its Extension to Cambodia, Lao PDR and Vietnam: Development Implications for North East India. These studies serve as valuable inputs for policy makers, academics and practitioners.

## RIS Annual Report 2021-22 Trade Facilitation, Connectivity and Regional Cooperation Connectivity Cooperation in Indo-Pacific

Indo-Pacific is reshaping the regional and global cooperation agenda. India came out with the Indo-Pacific vision, namely, Indo-Pacific Oceans' Initiative (IPOI), in 2019. The IPOI focuses on seven pillars: (i) Maritime Security; (ii) Maritime Ecology; (iii) Maritime Resources; (iv) Capacity Building and Resource Sharing; (v) Disaster Risk Reduction and Management; (vi) Science, Technology and Academic Cooperation; and (viii) Trade, Connectivity and Maritime Transport. RIS has been appointed as a knowledge partner for the Pillar 7 of the IPOI. Japan is the lead connectivity partner in the Pillar 7. RIS shared the knowledge product of the Pillar 7 of the IPOI with the MEA. This study, among others, identified a strategy to promote trade, connectivity and maritime cooperation in Indo-Pacific.

Both India and Japan believe that their development cooperation in the Indo-Pacific can contribute to unlocking the potential for an equitable, positive and forward-looking change in the region, and contribute to the socio-economic development of Southeast Asia, Africa and Island states in the Indian and Pacific oceans. With industrial development along connectivity corridors, we find convergences of the India's IPOI and Japan's Free and Open Indo-Pacific (FOIP). The RIS in partnership with the Embassy of Japan (EoJ) in New Delhi and the Ministry of External Affairs (MEA), Government of India started seminar series on 'Connectivity Cooperation for a Free, Open and Inclusive Indo-Pacific' in virtual mode since March 2021. The ASEAN Studies Center, Chulalongkorn University, Bangkok; the Research Institute on Contemporary Southeast Asia (IRASEC-CNRS) in Bangkok, and the ASEAN-India Centre (AIC) at RIS organised an international conference on "Asia's Post- Pandemic Order and Integration: Outlook of ASEAN and the Indo-Pacific at Crossroads" on 8 - 9 July 2021 in virtual mode. The two-day conference had six technical sessions which covered various facets of Indo-Pacific relations. RIS also came out with a special issue of the Journal of Asian Integration devoted on the Indo-Pacific (Indo-Pacific: A New Paradigm).

#### Maritime Security: Key Pillar in the Indo-Pacific

Indo-Pacific has been evolving around common challenges of the maritime security in the Indo-Pacific. The RIS in partnership with the MEA, Australian Government, National Maritime Foundation (NMF), and Research Centre for East and North East Regional Studies, Kolkata (CENERS-K) organised the 5th edition of the East Asia Summit (EAS) conference on maritime security cooperation, held at Kolkata on 23-24 November 2021 in hybrid mode. The 5th EAS conference discussed issues related to maritime security, information and resources sharing on the maritime domain, science and technology cooperation, disaster risk reduction and pandemic management and a panel discussion on way forward. Discussions reflected upon the importance of the IPOI and its seven pillars that has the potential to strengthen its India's pragmatic diplomacy in the region.

#### India-EU Connectivity Partnership

The India-European Union (EU) connectivity partnership is a vital component of the EU's Global Gateway initiative that aims to create 'links and not dependencies' through investments in quality infrastructure in order to connect goods, services, institutions, banks, businesses and people across the world. India-EU connectivity aims to promote transparent, inclusive, and rules-based connectivity between EU and India and with third countries and region, including Africa, Central Asia, Indo-Pacific. It also identifies new opportunities via quality infrastructure while upholding socio-economic benefits from sustainable growth,

shared norms and values. RIS launched a report entitled 'India-EU Connectivity: Partnership for Development, Demand and Democracy' on 28 October 2021. While launching the Report, EU Ambassador to India, H.E. Astuto said that leveraging the strengths of the European Investment Bank and the private sector will be the key to effective implementation of the India-EU connectivity partnership.

#### **ASEAN-India Connectivity Cooperation**

Connectivity of India's Northeast region is a key building block of realizing the vision of India's Act East Policy (AEP). To strengthen the connectivity between India and ASEAN, the Trilateral Highway (TH) between India, Myanmar, and Thailand is being developed, and there is a plan to extend the TH to Cambodia, Lao PDR, and Vietnam. Completion of the TH is likely to facilitate faster movement of goods and people between India and ASEAN and add growth impetus to India's Northeast. RIS Report titled "Trilateral Highway and Its Extension to Cambodia, Lao PDR and Vietnam: Development Implications for North East India" sheds light on the economic principles underlying the Northeast India market and to offer new ideas on how its potential can be better exploited in view of the TH development. This study assesses the status of the economic linkages of the NER, identifies the constraints behind and at the India– Myanmar border, and recommends policy measures to augment the linkages between the Northeast India and Southeast Asia. This study also reviews the institutional arrangements and identifies key elements that may hinder the movement of goods and people across the India–Myanmar border along the TH. It also analyses the development impacts of the TH on India's NER.

#### **Strengthening Regional Integration in BIMSTEC**

The RIS has been known for its contribution in regional cooperation and integration. Focus was relatively more on the BIMSTEC and ASEAN in 2021-22. Stronger partnership with the BIMSTEC and ASEAN not only supports our 'Neighborhood First' but also drives the 'Act East'. Besides generating research inputs, RIS organized several international events. For example, RIS in collaboration with the Institute of Social and Cultural Studies (ISCS), Kolkata organized a symposium entitled "BIMSTEC: A Vehicle for Growth and Development" on 25-26 October 2021. On 28 October 2021, RIS organized a webinar in association with International Food Policy Research Institute (IFPRI) on 'Exploring Cooperation in Sustainable Agriculture and Value Addition in BIMSTEC Region'. The ASEAN-India Centre (AIC), RIS in collaboration with the South Asia Watch on Trade, Economics and Environment (SAWTEE), Nepal; Indian Studies Center (ISC) of Chulalongkorn University, Thailand; Pathfinder Foundation, Sri Lanka; Centre for Research on Bhutanese Society (CRBS), Bhutan organized the 2nd Bay of Bengal Economic Dialogue 2022 in virtual mode. South Asian Network on Economic Modeling (SANEM), Dhaka was on lead.

#### Scaling up ASEAN-India Partnership

ASEAN has been at the core of the AEP. The RIS and its ASEAN-India Centre (AIC) have been working on the ASEAN-India relations through research studies, publications, seminars and conferences. RIS organised a panel discussion on theme of 'Building Post Covid-19 Economic Resilience in Asia and Pacific' on 29 July, 2021. RIS in collaboration with the Vietnam Institute for Indian and Southwest Asian Studies (VIISAS) of VASS organised the third International Conference on ASEAN–India Cultural and Civilizational Links (AICCL),

held at Hanoi and New Delhi on 7-8 October 2021 in hybrid mode. RIS in collaboration with the EXIM Bank of India and ASEAN-India Business Council (AIBC) organized a webinar on 'Deepening India-ASEAN Relations: Exploring New Avenues for Engagements' in run up to the 18th ASEAN-India Summit 2021 on 18 October 2021 in virtual mode. The webinar focused upon the current issues on India-ASEAN bilateral trade and investment, identifying areas of collaboration to further expand regional trade and integration, and ways for strengthening infrastructure and connectivity in the post-Covid-19 world. RIS organised a webinar on 'ASEAN-India: Harnessing Connectivity and Supply Chain Resilience' on 21 October 2021 in run up to the 18th ASEAN-India and 14th East Asia Summit. RIS in collaboration with the Asian Confluence organised a webinar on 'ASEAN-India Summit 2021 and Major Takeaways' on 18 November 2021. The RIS and Embassy of Indonesia jointly organised a panel discussion on ASEAN-India FTA to identify the potentials and challenges for deepening India-Indonesia economic engagement on 29 November 2021 in virtual format.

#### **Commemorating Thirty Years of ASEAN-India Relations**

To commemorate the 30 years of ASEAN-India dialogue partnership, the RIS organized webinars in virtual mode to focus on the persistent challenges and emerging opportunities in ASEAN-India relations. The first of its kind was conducted on 18 February 2022. Two special remarks were given by H.E. Mr. Ung Sean, Ambassador, Royal Embassy of Cambodia, New Delhi and Amb. Jayant N. Khobragade, Indian Ambassador to ASEAN, Indian Mission to ASEAN, Jakarta. The RIS in collaboration with the Chulalongkorn University also published a commemorative volume entitled "Thirty Years of ASEAN-India Relations: ASEAN-India Strengthening Partnership and Post-Pandemic Future".

#### Training and Capacity Building and Dissemination

In 2021-21, the RIS started an online training and capacity building entitled "ASEAN-India Development Partnership Programme (AIDPP)" on 16-20 August 2021, which was supported by the Ministry of External Affairs (MEA). The AIDPP was hosted jointly by the AIC at RIS; Asian Confluence and the ASEAN Studies Centre of ISEAS–Yusof Ishak Institute, Singapore, held on 16-20 August 2021. The AIDPP programme comprised with several lectures and interactive sessions that include geo-politics, economic relations, trade and investment, connectivity, trade facilitation and priority sectors for the ASEAN-India relations. The AIC at RIS organised a week-long online public lectures on 'India and International Development' during 14 – 19 June 2021. On research and policy dissemination front, the AIC at RIS issued the Journal of Asian Economic Integration (JAEI) from Sage and published the two issues of Vol. 3 in 2021-22. Besides, the AIC at RIS continued to publish the commentary series and working papers on several cross-cutting themes.

#### **Going Forward**

Connectivity is a means, not an end in itself. Its main purpose is to facilitate economic and social integration. Connectivity is crucial for sustainable development. Regional cooperation is needed to strengthen the connectivity partnership between nations. Stronger connectivity and cooperation may yield the regional integration, not only resilient but also people-centric and inclusive. Going forward, to realize the true potential of the connectivity projects in the backdrop the AEP, an assessment of the present state of affairs, challenges and opportunities is needed. The current evaluation will lead to design a long term perspective plan for India in realizing the Indo-Pacific vision.

#### Third International Conference on ASEAN-India Cultural and Civilizational Links

The ASEAN-India Centre (AIC) at RIS in collaboration with the Vietnam Institute for Indian and Southwest Asian Studies (VIISAS) organised the third International Conference on ASEAN-India Cultural and Civilizational Links (AICCL), held at Hanoi and New Delhi on 7-8 October 2021 in hybrid mode. ## **Exploring Regional Cooperation in Sustainable Agriculture** and Value Addition in **BIMSTEC**

On 28 October 2021, RIS organized a webinar in association with International Food Policy Research Institute (IFPRI) on "Exploring Cooperation in Sustainable Agriculture and Value Addition in BIMSTEC Region", where distinguished speakers, chairs, and panelists participated from the member states.

The webinar was inaugurated with the welcome remarks of Professor Sachin Chaturvedi, Director General, RIS. He highlighted several important points on capacity building and collaborative work of the member states, expanding the development frontiers in the region, identifying the investment opportunities, and several others. Dr Suresh Babu, Senior Research Fellow & Head of Capacity Strengthening, IFPRI, Washington gave his opening remarks pointing out the importance of the priority alignment in the region. He further mentioned how a sustainable food system is the most important link in achieving the SDG goals and directly or indirectly affects nine out of seventeen SDGs.

The inaugural address was given by Professor Satish Y. Deodhar, Professor, Economics Area, Indian Institute of Management, Ahmedabad. He talked about the impact of climate change on food security, the need for a nudge in connectivity, promotion of going vocal for local, weather forecast, value chains, knowledge sharing, and also highlighted the problem of lopsided production in agriculture.

After the inaugural session, there were three sessions. The first technical session was on 'Promoting Trade in Agriculture in BIMSTEC' where the chair and the panelists highlighted that agriculture in the

region is highly vulnerable to climate change, hence, there is a risk on food security and value chain disruptions. Several suggestions were also made like increasing labor productivity and produce quality, promoting fair trade practices, food safety regulations, focusing on regional trade, etc.

The second technical session was on 'Prospects of Food Processing and Regional Value Chains in BIMSTEC' suggesting addressing and overcoming the bottlenecks, higher involvement of farmers in the value chains, improving the packaging at farm level, higher regional performance in various processed food sub-sectors, value chain upgrading, efficient use of data and improved data collection, etc. The third session on 'Food Security and Safety Issues in Agriculture' pointed out to focus on the nexus between agriculture

and nutrition, to diversify the produce, to spend on reducing the food loss and waste, to focus on private sector participation, etc.

The programme ended with a closing session chaired by Dr Suresh Babu, key recommendations were presented by Dr Priyadarshi Dash, Associate Professor, RIS. Valedictory address was given by Mr Han Thein Kyaw, Director-in-Charge (Agricultural Cooperation), BIMSTEC Secretariat, Dhaka, Bangladesh. The eminent panel discussed the prospects of India-Indonesia economic engagements in light of ASEAN-India FTA Review.

#### India-EU Connectivity: Partnership for Development, **Demand and Democracy**

The India-European Union (EU) Connectivity Partnership will be a vital component of the EU's Global Gateway initiative that aims to create 'links and not dependencies' through investments in quality infrastructure in order to connect goods, services, institutions, banks, businesses and people across the world, according to Ugo Astuto, Ambassador, Delegation of the European Union to India and Bhutan.

Launching a report by the RIS titled 'India-EU Connectivity: Partnership for Development, Demand and Democracy,' on 28 October 2021, Ambassador Astuto also said leveraging the strengths of the European Investment Bank and the private sector will be key to effective implementation of the India-EU Connectivity Partnership.

Speaking at the event organised by the RIS, Mr Sandeep Chakravorty, Joint Secretary (Europe West), Ministry of

External Affairs, said India and the EU have ensured that their bilateral Connectivity Partnership was of a 'high standard' and focuses on people-to-people connectivity as well as mobility. The bilateral Partnership has spurred similar ideas in other countries and regions for reasons including the importance of forging 'secure and trusted' supply chains, he added. Mr Chakravorty said there is a plan to launch an India-EU 'Connectivity Forum' soon to take forward viable projects in this context.

Ambassador (Dr) Mohan Kumar, Chairman, RIS, highlighted the strategic

importance of the India-EU ConnectivityAmbassador (Dr) Partnership and stressed the need to expedite negotiations on India-EU trade and investment pacts to ably support the implementation of the bilateral connectivity agreement. Professor Sachin Chaturvedi, Director General, RIS, said the RIS report has an in-depth coverage and analysis of India-EU trade and investment, areas of cooperation in connectivity as well as ways to use connectivity for sustainable development and green transition by leveraging Science, Technology and

Innovation (STI). He said the report also looks at alternative energy resources such as green hydrogen, solar and other kinds of non-conventional energy, in addition to financial connectivity from the institutional perspective where linkages between financial institutions, banks and providers of fintech have been examined in detail.

During the subsequent panel discussion, Ms Bhaswati Mukherjee, former Ambassador of India to the Netherlands, pointed out the convergence between India and the EU on connectivity principles including on sustainability. She said the partnership agreement will be able to address the emerging challenges including that of financial and environmental sustainability. Professor Gulshan Sachdeva, Chairperson, Centre for European Studies, Jawaharlal Nehru University, said the India-EU Connectivity Partnership has huge potential and geo-political value with regard to enhancing connectivity in third countries as well, and will be

an alternative to the Belt and Road Initiative of China.

Dr Constantino Xavier, Fellow, Centre for Social and Economic Progress, said since the bilateral connectivity partnership is based on democratic principles and lays emphasis on interoperability, in addition to transparency and good governance, it could help set regional standards and even help in the formation of a global connectivity partnership. Another important aspect was the decision of India and the EU to ensure that they, at a governmental level, will lead and facilitate, but not play an overwhelming role.

Professor S. K. Mohanty, RIS, mentioned that

technology intensive trade is at the core of India-EU trade, while there are complementarities in their bilateral services trade. Speaking about the trends in development finance, Dr Priyadarshi Dash, Associate Professor, RIS, said there is now a focus on ESG

(Environmental, Social, and Governance) norms. He observed that there was a need for greater financial connectivity between India and the EU in order to help both sides achieve their full potential, notably in the areas of Fintech.

## ASEAN-India Development Partnership Programme (AIDPP): An Online Training and Capacity Building Programme



Ms. Megan Jones, Director, Regional Maritime Engagement and Programs, Australian Department of Foreign Affairs and Trade (DFAT), Canberra delivered the Special Address. Keynote Address was delivered by Ambassador Riva Ganguly Das, Secretary (East), Ministry of External Affairs (MEA), Government of India, New Delhi.

The 5th EAS Conference on Maritime Security Cooperation discussed issues related to maritime security, information and resources sharing on the maritime domain, science and technology cooperation, disaster risk reduction and pandemic management and a panel discussion on way forward. Discussions reflected upon the importance of Indo-Pacific Oceans Initiative (IPOI) and its seven pillars that has the potential to strengthen its India's pragmatic diplomacy in the region. The IPOI is focused on better management of shared interests of the participating countries. There is an urgent need to facilitate convergences of national and regional interests in the Indo-Pacific and IPOI is suited for such a scenario. Over 90 delegates attained the conference. The conference covered dynamic issues of Indo-Pacific and identified actionable agenda for future course of Indo-Pacific region.

The first session on Maritime Security was chaired by Dr. Malini V Shankar, Vice-Chancellor, Indian Maritime University (IMU), Chennai. Superintendent Joanne Prior, Australian Border Force; Commander Touch Ponleu, National Committee for Maritime Security (NCMS), Cambodia; Mr. Jian Xin, China Maritime Safety Administration, Beijing, China; Vice-Admiral Pradeep Chauhan, AVSM & Bar, VSM, IN (Retd.), Director General, National Maritime Foundation (NMF), New Delhi; Mr. Takehiko Wajima, Director, Space and Maritime Security

Policy Division, Ministry of Foreign Affairs of Japan (MoFA), Japan; and Commodore P.K. Banerjee, VSM (Retd.), Distinguished Fellow, CENERS-K, Kolkata were the speakers in this session. Capt. Sarabjeet Singh Parmar, Executive Director, NMF moderated the second session and the theme of the session was Resource Sharing. The session speakers were Mr. Kevin McEvoy, Australian Maritime Safety Authority; Captain Himadri Das, IN, Research Fellow, NMF, New Delhi; Major Surendran Kumar, Information Fusion Centre, Singapore; and Prof. Suman K Mukherjee, Distinguished Fellow, CENERS-K, Kolkata. The session on science and technology cooperation was chaired by Dr. Bhaskar Balakrishnan, Science Diplomacy Fellow, RIS. Mr. Mark Alcock, Geoscience Australia; Rear Admiral KM Ramakrishnan, [ACNS [Communications, Space, & Network-Centric Operations (CSNCO)], Indian Navy; and Mr. Christopher Merritt, US Mission to ASEAN were the speakers in this session. The fourth session was on Pandemic and Disaster Risk Reduction and Management, which was chaired by Mr. Taguchi Seiichiro, Minister, Embassy of Japan in India. In this session, the speakers were Captain Amanda Garlick, Royal Australian Navy; Surgeon Rear Admiral Shankar Narayan, Additional Director General Armed Forces Medical Services (Addl DGAFMS (E&S)), Indian

Navy; Dr. Zaw Minn Aung, Dy. Director General, Ministry of Foreign Affairs (MoFA), Myanmar; and Captain Sarabjeet Singh Parmar, Executive Director, National Maritime Foundation (NMF), New Delhi. The session discussed how disaster risk reduction in East Asia has particularly become a serious challenge in the post-pandemic period. Commodore C Uday Bhaskar, Director, Society for Policy Studies (SPS) moderated the panel discussion on Way Forward. The eminent speakers of the session were Mr. Justin Whyatt, Department of Foreign Affairs and Trade (DFAT), Australia; Vice-Admiral Pradeep Chauhan, DG, NMF, New Delhi; Amb. Foster Gultom, Former Indonesian Ambassador to the Republic of Kazakhstan and the Republic of Tajikistan, Jakarta; and Mr. Vishvas Vidu Sapkal, Joint Secretary (South and Indo-Pacific), Ministry of External Affairs (MEA), New Delhi. In the closing session, Closing Remarks and Vote of Thanks were extended by the Mr. Manoj Pandey, Dy. Gen Arun Roye, AVSM, VSM (Retd.), Vice-President, CENERS-K.

In the Opening Session, opening remarks were made by Prof. Suthiphand Chirathivat, ASEAN Studies Center, Chulalongkorn University; Assoc. Prof. Claire Thi Lien Tran (IRASEC CNRS); and Prof. Prabir De, ASEAN-India Centre (AIC), RIS. 
#### **ASEAN-India: Harnessing Connectivity and Supply Chain Resilience**



# Twenty Years of Mekong-Ganga Cooperation (MGC): Achievements and Way Forward


Launched in Vientiane, Lao PDR in 2000, the Mekong-Ganga Cooperation (MGC) completed twenty years in 2020. The MGC initiative is a subregional cooperation organisation comprising India and five ASEAN countries, namely, Cambodia, Lao PDR, Myanmar, Thailand and Vietnam. To commemorate the 20 years of establishment of MGC, the Indian Council of World Affairs (ICWA) in collaboration with the ASEAN-India Centre (AIC) at RIS organised an international conference entitled "Twenty Years of Mekong-Ganga Cooperation (MGC)" on 5-6 November 2020 at

New Delhi in virtual mode. Edited by Dr Prabir De, this volume is an outcome of the aforesaid conference, and examines the connected past, present, and future of MGC. This commemorative volume presents a selected set of papers, which were presented at the aforesaid conference. Although the economic engagements between India and Mekong have been limited, there is further scope to scale up our economic relations. This book shows the path to strengthen the MGC partnership in the third decade of its establishment.

#### Thirty Years of ASEAN-India Relations: ASEAN-India Strengthening Partnership and Post-Pandemic Future

The Association of Southeast Asian Nations (ASEAN) and India are bound together by their shared history and culture. Relation with ASEAN is one of the cornerstones of India's Foreign Policy. Starting in 1992, when India joined ASEAN as a sectoral dialogue partner, ASEAN and India are going to complete thirty years of their bilateral relations in 2022. The ongoing pandemic has imposed many global and regional challenges. Moving from cooperation to integration, there is a need to jointly address challenges to strengthening the partnership between


ASEAN and India in various areas. Edited by Dr Prabir De and Dr Suthiphand Chirathivat, this book addresses some of these challenges in a lucid manner. It presents a set of 15 research papers, which were presented at the sixth ASEAN-India Network of Think-Tanks (AINTT) roundtable in 2020. Divided in five major sections, this volume reviews some of the achievements of ASEAN-India relations while completing three decades of partnership, and presents a set of new agenda for the fourth decade. It also underlines the desire of the ASEAN countries and India to diversify and further strengthen the relations in the third decade. This volume is also published to commemorate the thirty years of ASEAN-India relations.



#### Trilateral Highway and Its Extension to Cambodia, Lao PDR and Vietnam: Development Implications for North East India

This Report assesses the status of the economic linkages of the NER, identifies the constraints behind and at the India–Myanmar border, and recommends policy measures to augment the linkages between the NER and Southeast Asia. This study also reviews the institutional arrangements and identifies key elements that may hinder the movement of goods and people across the India–Myanmar border along the TH. It also analyses the development impacts of the TH on India's NER.

## **STI Work Programme**

STI Work Programme is an agile programme in RIS that does work on multiple themes and issues with continuity and changes in approach and focus while taking into consideration the emphasis of the government as well as the global contemporary developments. It consists of STI Policy Programme (STIPP) and Science Diplomacy Programme (SDP). The latter is a programme, funded by Department of Science and Technology (DST) and is the first such programme on Science Diplomacy in India. STI Policy Programme focuses on policy research but scope of its activities and publications are beyond this. It involves *inter alia*, collaboration, networking and joint research with institutions in India and abroad.

#### **STI Policy Programme**

During 2021-22, the STI Policy Programme (STIPP) covered various themes such as STI developments during COVID19 pandemic, WTO TRIPS waiver, STI for SDGs, emerging technologies such as AI, Robotics, Synthetic Biology, Digital Sequence Information (DSI), Technology Trade and Technology Wars, Digital Trade, Digital Payment Systems, FinTech, Digital Health, 4IR, Climate change, clean and renewable energy, Green Hydrogen and so on. In 2021, in wake of COVID Pandemic, to address the global crisis in access to vaccines, India and South Africa submitted a proposal to WTO's TRIPS Council seeking a waiver on Intellectual Property Rights (IPRs) and this was supported by many developing countries and was opposed by *inter alia*, European Commission and USA. Later USA agreed to a partial waiver. RIS in association with South Centre, Geneva organized a series of webinars to discuss and mobilise support for the TRIPS Waiver.

RIS, as the Knowledge Partner to the Office of Principal Scientific Adviser (PSA) in the Global Pilot Project on STI for SDGs of the UN (an initiative under the Technology Facilitation Mechanism launched as part of the Agenda 2030 for implementation of the SDGs), organised a series of webinars with the stakeholders and submitted the interim report with detailed Technology-Roadmaps on four selected SDGs namely SDGs 2,3,6 and 7 to the Office of PSA. Several workshops and consultations were organized under this Project.

Research on emerging technologies and their impacts has been a key feature in STIPP. Among them, Artificial Intelligence is emerging as a key technology and STIPP is working on its impacts, particularly the Ethical, Legal and Social Implications (ELSI) aspects. In order to achieve the UN Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) by 2030 and ensure that no one is left behind, emphasis on inclusive and responsible AI is significant. RIS would also be working with UNESCO on this issue as UNESCO has developed Guidelines on AI Ethics. Researches on other impacts of AI continue and outcomes will include more events and publications.

## New Technologies and Development Issues

Digital Sequence Information governance (DSI) is emerging as an important issue particularly in access and benefit sharing (ABS) in theory and practice. Negotiations under Convention on Biological Diversity (CBD) are in advanced stages and a solution may be reached soon. RIS has been working on CBD and ABS related themes. RIS organised a webinar on Digital Sequence Information (DSI): Issues and Implications on 31 August 2021.

A faculty from RIS is also part of an expert panel constituted by one of the agencies in UK on this issue. Emerging technologies like AI, robotics, Genome Editing, Synthetic Biology, and, Gene Drives are inter alia, themes of research under STIPP. RIS faculty are contributing to the literature on this as evident from the publications. In addition to this they are working with Department of Biotechnology (DBT) on Synthetic Biology. Technology Assessment (TA) is an important theme in Science Policy and is also widely practiced. RIS is part of a project on capacity building in TA in Africa. This project is led by UNCTAD and ITAS, with KIT (Germany) serving as a partner institution. Meetings, related to this have been held and RIS faculty member is contributing to proposed publications including a manual on TA for this project. RIS is also a contributing institution to the Global TA project's forthcoming volume '*Technology Assessment in a globalized world - Facing the challenges of transnational technology governance*'.

South-South Co-operation (SSC) is a key theme in RIS work on Development Cooperation and SSC in STI is of critically important in this. Faculty members from this program co-authored '*Mapping South-South Cooperation in Science, Technology and Innovation for Theory and Practice*' published by UN Office on South-South Cooperation and UNDP. RIS-South Centre Webinar Series on TRIPS Waiver included four webinars on topics such as 'TRIPS Waiver: Issues and Challenges' (5 June 2021), 'TRIPS Waiver:Issues and Challenges for Africa' (12 June 2021), 'TRIPS Waiver: Issues and Challenges for Latin America' (19 June 2021), and 'TRIPS Waiver: Issues and Challenges for South East Asia' (26 June 2021), with a wide spectrum of experts from these regions evoking significant responses.

Digitization and Development is another theme in which STI Programme is working on. RIS is a partner institution in PRODIGEES Project funded by European Commission. Due to the COVID, the Project's activities were affected. However, Project meetings were held online and plans for publications were initiated. A faculty from this project will be seconded to IDOS, Bonn in the second half of 2022. RIS has been part of projects on Responsible Research and Innovation (RRI) including NewHoRRIzon project which was completed in early 2022. RIS contributed to this project by bringing in concepts and examples from India to enrich RRI and to learn from RRI projects.

Besides these, RIS faculty regularly take part in external events, work with different Ministries and Departments, UN agencies like UNESCO and conduct peer reviews. For example, RIS faculty was part of the consultation process of India's forthcoming STI Policy undertaken by the DST and Office of PSA and did peer-review of the draft STI Policy.

RIS has been actively engaging with key institutions and experts on the topic of emerging technologies such as AI and DSI. RIS organised a webinar on "AI Ethics and Responsible AI" on 19 May 2021. The panelists drawn from IIT, NITI Aayog, MeitY, UNDP etc, stressed on addressing geo-political, psychological, privacy and ethical issues and challenges of emerging technologies like AI.

#### New Technologies and Development Issues

Research on SDGs is integral to RIS work programme. Therefore, recognising the significance of finance for tackling development issues and achieving SDGs and success stories of FinTech in Kenya and India, RIS, India International Centre (IIC) in collaboration with University of Essex, UK organised a webinar on 'Banks, Finance and Changing form of Technology: New Options with FinTech' on 23 April 2021. Bringing together several stakeholders, the webinar emphasised on scope of replicating models of cooperation through innovative development cooperation projects in Asia and Africa and harnessing FinTech in an inclusive manner and ensuring safety and security of digital transactions.

Further, RIS organised a webinar on 'Indian Perspectives on Innovation Incentives: Health Impact Fund and Green Impact Fund Technology' (with Global Justice Programme of Yale University) on 13 November 2021, as well as a Special Session on Innovations and Data with Focus on Sustainable Economy at Bhopal on 26 December 2021.

Under the aegis of STIP Forum Lecture Series (started in *September 2017*), eight public lectures were held during the period from April 2021 to March 2022. These public lectures were delivered by eminent experts on important topics such as data analytics and long-term COVID19; S&T and the pandemic; food processing technologies and rural economy; Solar Physics; energy *Swarajya* through solar energy; translational research through Traditional Medicines; global energy transitions; and re-wiring the brain. RIS coordinated three of these public lectures; while other STIP Forum partner institutions (TERI and Vigyan Prasar) coordinated the rest. Till March 2022, a total of 42 such public lectures have been successfully organised. The Science Technology and Innovation Policy (STIP) Forum was set up in August 2017 by RIS, in collaboration with the India Habitat Centre, TERI, CEFIPRA, and Vigyan Prasar, with the objective of promoting debate on various aspects of Science, Technology and Innovation Policy. It aims to bridge the gap between the science and society for the dissemination of scientific achievements as well as for generalising debate of societal aspirations and promoting responsible research and innovations.

During the period 2021-22, RIS came out with several flagship and key reports and its faculty members have published numerous research papers, articles and chapters in reputed peer-reviewed journals, books and authored many policy briefs and discussions papers on various topics related to Science, Technology, and Innovation (STI); and New and Emerging Technologies and Development Issues. A number of short articles/opinion pieces/commentaries published in popular media, including leading newspapers, have been authored by the faculty members. They have contributed immensely to the writing of RIS flagship reports. Major reports published during the period as mentioned earlier included *World Trade and Development Report 2021;* Report on *India-EU Connectivity Partnership for Development, Demand and Democracy;* and a Report on *Digitalisation and Development.* 

RIS faculty members contributed substantially to the writing of the 'International Cooperation Review Committee Report' for the Experts' Review Committee, which was constituted by the Ministry of Science and Technology, under the Chairmanship of Dr Anil Kakodkar, former Chairman of Atomic Energy Commission of India and of which Professor Sachin Chaturvedi, Director General, RIS was a member too. This report made a comprehensive review of the international cooperation activities of India's Science & Technology Departments and provided key policy

recommendations. The report was released by the Hon'ble Union Minister of State (Independent Charge) for Science & Technology, Dr Jitendra Singh on 21 July 2021.

A wide range of topics has been covered under the publications by the RIS and its faculty associated with the STI work programme during 2021-22 such as STI for SDGs, Technology Trade and Technology Trade Wars, Global Health Governance, Digital Health, Digital Payment Systems, FinTech, Women in STEM, New and Emerging Technologies such as Artificial Intelligence, Robotics, 4IR, Green Hydrogen and Off-Grid Solar Energy Systems etc. The issues of global governance, socio-economic impact assessment and ethics around emerging 4IR technologies such as AI have also been dealt with these publications. Topics related to South-South Cooperation in STI, access to technologies, WTO, and TRIPS Waiver (esp. *w.r.t* to COVID19 –related therapeutics such as vaccines and drugs) have also been featured in the publications. RIS faculty member has co-written two chapters to a volume on global Technology Assessment (TA) besides contributing to an article on TA in India for the volume on Global TA.

Three issues of RIS's international, open-access and peer-reviewed journal, *Asian Biotechnology and Development Review* (ABDR) have been published during the period with contributions from several researchers, practitioners, experts, academicians from across the world on many key and contemporary topics related to STI, Biotechnology and Biodiversity, including a Special Issue of ABDR on Synthetic Biology.

#### Science Diplomacy Programme

S&T lay at the core of finding solutions to the grand challenges as well as several development issues facing the Global-South. Therefore, science diplomacy and the need to integrate S&T into foreign and public policy, diplomacy and management of international relations assume far greater importance. The present discourse on science diplomacy remains Global-North centric. RIS-Forum for Indian Science Diplomacy (FISD) aims to enhance capacity, develop networks in science diplomacy and contribute to research and strategic thinking. This will enable relevant science diplomacy for other developing countries and economies in transition in the Global South to strengthen STI ecosystem, share best practises, achieve SDGs and offer markets for Indian STI products and services. Similarly, the Global Development Centre (GDC) aims to contribute to the alternative development paradigm through exchange of best practices, showcasing innovation and success stories and possible replication/adoption among peer countries in the Global South.


During the period, RIS, FISD, and GDC organised several webinars, events, technical bilateral sessions on prospects of S&T cooperation in achieving SDGs, technological capability in semiconductors, sharing of India's vaccine platform and digital payments with countries like Vietnam, Taiwan, Keyna, Ethiopia, Mozambique, Malawi, Rwanda and South Sudan. These saw the participation of several stakeholders, including relevant institutions, senior officials from health ministries, experts, etc. which elicited good response. With the EU's Horizon 2020 coming to an end and in order to explore the prospects of India-EU S&T Cooperation, RIS-FISD organised a webinar on *Horizon Europe: The Way Forward in India-EU Cooperation in Science, Technology and Innovation* on 23 August 2021.

To facilitate networking with institutions in science diplomacy, science policy activities/courses, across the globe, FISD developed a database of more than 110 institutions. FISD team members have participated, presented, delivered lectures in various national and international training programmes, workshops, schools, conferences and seminars, etc. on science diplomacy and related issues. South-South Cooperation is integral to RIS work programmes.

In view of India's efforts through the International Solar Alliance (ISA) and its significant role in building diplomatic ties and strategic partnerships across the Global North and South as well as India's economic diplomacy and foreign policy on climate change, RIS together with the GDC and FISD organised a webinar 'Tapping Solar Energy: Sharing India's Experience and Forging Partnership with Asia, Pacific Island Countries' on 17 June 2021, and an online lecture on 'Channelising the Sun: Ideas, Institutions and India's New Climate Diplomacy' on 29 June 2021 respectively.

FISD follows Indian and global developments in scientific research, technological advancements of significance, science diplomacy, S&T policy and governance and electronically circulates its fortnightly, *Science Diplomacy News Alert* to more than 8000 members including diplomats, former and present science counselors, institutions engaged in science policy/science diplomacy/science technology studies, local embassies, and policymakers, etc across the globe. During April 2021-March 2022, twenty-four issues have been published. During the period, several publications have come out on the theme of Science Diplomacy and International STI Cooperation too such as on India-Vietnam and India-Taiwan STI cooperation. Three issues of *Science Diplomacy Review* (SDR) have come out during the period with contributions from several researchers, practitioners, experts, academicians from across the world on many key and contemporary topics related to Science Diplomacy.

In April 2022- March 2023, more activities are lined up, and more publications, including ten chapters in different volumes will be published. STI Programme is contributing to T20/G20 process and will be fully engaged with them in 2023 as India will take up the G20 Presidency in 2023.

#### Banks, Finance and Changing form of Technology: New Options with FINTECH

Speaking at a webinar on 'Banks, Finance and Changing form of Technology: New Options with FINTECH' organised by RIS, India International Centre in collaboration with University of Essex, UK on 23 April 2021, Mr T. Rabi Sankar said, "the concentration of two or three third party providers in these retail payment space could give rise to competitive weaknesses. That is a challenge that



we need to look at and solve going forward." He added that the overall theme of speeding up Fintech absorption in the financial space without undermining the integrity or stability of the financial system will remain the primary challenge for regulators in the next decade or so.

Speaking on the occasion, Dr Srinivas Yanamandra, Chief of Compliance, New Development Bank, Shanghai, said it was important to have a differentiated regulatory approach – one for start-ups with a view to promote innovation, and another for Big Tech players to ensure that there are no monopolistic and anti-competitive practices. Pointing out the recent anti-trust-related actions by the People's Bank of China against some leading Big Tech players in China, he said other countries were also looking at that approach and considering replicating it in their own jurisdiction.

Professor Thankom Arun, Director, Centre for Accountability and Global Development (CAGD),

University of Essex, UK, said while the new technologies have the potential to reshape banks and other financial institutions, it was important to harness such technologies for the betterment of the entire population. He further stressed that Fintech should ideally reduce the cost of financial intermediation and ensure financial inclusion.

Professor Sachin Chaturvedi, Director General, RIS, said Fintech investments have grown globally following success stories like M-Pesa in Kenya and the UPI in India, adding that many developing countries were looking to emulate countries like India and Kenya in this regard. There is scope for replicating such models of cooperation through innovative development cooperation projects in Asia and Africa. However, he said it was important for regulators and the players to ensure the safety and security of digital transactions.

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#### Channelising the Sun: Ideas, Institutions and India's New Climate Diplomacy

The Forum for Indian Science Diplomacy (FISD) organised an online lecture by Dr Vyoma Jha, J.S.D, Stanford Law School on 'Climate Diplomacy' on Tuesday 29 June 2021. Dr Jyoma Jha, J.S.D, Stanford Law School lecture focused on 'Channelising the Sun: Ideas, Institutions and India's New Climate Diplomacy'. She emphasised that there is a 'climate turn in India's Science Diplomacy'. The creation of ISA marks the integration of India's climate and science diplomacy, setting the background for India's role in climate governance and future climate negotiations in COP26.

#### AI Ethics and Responsible AI

Artificial Intelligence (AI) developers and policymakers need to address the dangers stemming from deepfakes and biases impacting privacy as well as the emerging technology's damaging geo-political implications and psychological consequences, according to experts.

Speaking at a webinar organised by the New Delhibased research institute RIS on 'AI ethics and responsible AI' on 19 May 2021, Ms Renata Dessallien, UN Resident Coordinator in India, said AI increasingly has geopolitical implications as the emerging technology is disrupting the current distribution of power between countries, adding that this important issue was not currently getting adequate attention.

Addressing the same event, Professor V. Kamakoti, Department of Computer Science and Engineering, IIT Madras, talked about the dangers of AI, including certain instances where the use of the technology was not fair and responsible.

Professor Sachin Chaturvedi, Director General, RIS, said the access, equity and inclusion framework and the humanitarian value system are important while looking at the ethical aspects of AI that have an economic imperative for the developing world. Inclusive and responsible AI is vital to ensure that no one is left behind

and to achieve the UN Sustainable Development Goals by 2030, he added.

Professor Bernd Stahl, Director, Centre for Computing and Social Responsibility, De Montfort University, UK, said in order to get a handle on the ethics of AI, "it was important to not think about an individual technology, but conceptualise AI as a set of interlocking ecosystems which are driven and enabled to a certain degree by AI."

Mr Santosh K. Misra, IAS, CEO, Tamil Nadu e-Governance Agency, said the government has an intertwining role of being the promoter of AI and also of being the regulator and user of AI. He said the state government has brought out a policy on ethical AI. It was probably the first in the country and even among the few government to do so, the official said.

Dr Grace Eden, Assistant Professor, Indraprastha Institute of Information Technology, Delhi, Mr Ameen Jauhar, Senior Resident Fellow, Vidhi Centre for Legal Policy, Mr Rohit Satish, Consultant, NITI Aayog and Senior Fellow, Wadhwani Institute of Artificial Intelligence, Ms Vidushi Marda, Senior Programme Officer, Article 19 and Non-resident Research Analyst, Carnegie India, and Dr Krishna Ravi Srinivas, Consultant, RIS, spoke on the occasion.

The topic of this public lecture was "COVID-19: Urgent

Dr Amitava Banerjee, in his very insightful lecture elaborated on the importance of data science in helping devise a timely and effective strategies for tackling COVID-19 pandemic.

Dr Banerjee argued that the current pandemic can be better termed as "syndemic" (a set of linked health problems involving two or more afflictions, interacting synergistically, and contributing to excess burden of

disease in a population) and therefore better concerted integrated care pathways are required

better concerted integrated care pathways are required to address the challenges. ■

#### **Science & Technology and the Pandemic**

The 36th STIP Forum Lecture was delivered by Dr Renu Swarup, Secretary, Department of Biotechnology, Government of India on 5 August 2021 via online platform. The topic of this public lecture was "Science & Technology and the Pandemic".

In her very insightful address, Dr Swarup covered the key aspects of what has been the science and technology response to the pandemic and how S&T has been playing at the forefront, in response to the pandemic. The enabling policy environment created over the period greatly helped S&T perform exceptionally well towards this pandemic;

whether by building capacities in S&T across our academic institutions, or bringing together the industry, the academia, the Start-Ups, and forging international collaborations. The focus has been on addressing the gaps, building a strong ecosystem, identifying the new technology platforms, connecting Industry-Academia-Start-Ups.

She elaborated on the "Science-based Response Strategy" that India took well on time to tackle



the pandemic. This strategy focussed on product development such as vaccines, medical devices and diagnostics, bio-therapeutics and botanicals, with the proper ecosystem support measures such as fast-track approvals, product scale-up facilities, mentoring and support to Start-Ups. This roadmap provided clear focus on what needs to be done and also provided the understanding on the stakeholders, which helped the government to connect all those stakeholders.

#### Food Processing and Rural Economy: Technological Options for Farmers and Self-Help Groups (SHGs)

The 37th STIP Forum Lecture was delivered by Dr Ashutosh Upadhyay, Professor, Department of Food Science and Technology and Dean Academic, National Institute of Food Technology Entrepreneurship and Management (NIFTEM) (an autonomous institution under the Ministry of Food Processing Industries) on 29 September 2021 via an online platform. The topic of this public lecture was "Food Processing and Rural Economy: Technological Options for Farmers and Self-Help Groups (SHGs)".

In his very insightful address, Dr Upadhyay covered the range of issues related to the topic, including the significance of the food processing sector for India in general

and for the rural economy, in particular. Given the low share of processed food in India, there is a serious problem of high food wastage, especially of the fruits and vegetables. In this context, there is an immense scope and opportunity in the food processing sector, which needs to be tapped to provide a thrust to the rural economy. Towards this cause, farmers and Self-Help Groups (SHGs) can play a key role, provided they have the access to the available technological solutions at an affordable rate. Dr Upadhyay elaborated on the gamut of technologies that are available for uptake by the individual farmers and SHGs. These technologies have been developed by the publicfunded research centres and cover the entire value chain of the food processing sector. He further gave

a detailed overview of such technologies within the sub-sectors such as dairy, fruits and vegetables, cereals and seeds, oilseeds, pulses, beverages, meat and poultry products, honey and spices.

## Growth of Solar Physics in India from Ground and Space-based Platforms

The 38th STIP Forum Lecture was delivered by Professor Dipankar Banerjee, Director, Aryabhatta Research Institute of Observational Sciences (ARIES) Nainital, Uttarakahnd on 29 October 2021 via online platform. The topic of this public lecture was "Growth of Solar Physics in India from Ground and Space-based Platforms".

In his very insightful address, Professor Dipankar Banerjee provided an overview of the status and prospect of solar physics in India. He began his lecture by giving a detailed overview of the solar facilities existing at various places across the country and explained

the technical nuances of the subject. He talked about sophisticated instruments such as Multi Application Solar Telescope, which is needed to study the variability of different timescale in the Sun, sunspots, solar flares and so on. Professor Banerjee elaborated on the proposed National Large Solar Telescope (NLST) which will be 2m class optical and near infra-red (IR) observational facility in the country.

#### Realising Energy Swarajya in India through Solar: Towards Ensuring Energy Security and Climate Change Mitigation

The 39th STIP Forum Lecture was delivered by Professor Chetan Singh Solanki, Professor at the Department of Energy Science and Engineering, IIT Bombay, Founder of Energy Swaraj Foundation and the Brand Ambassador of Solar Energy for the state of Madhya Pradesh, on 22 December 2021 via an online platform. The topic of this public lecture was "Realising Energy Swarajya in India through Solar: Towards Ensuring Energy Security and Climate Change Mitigation".

In his very insightful and thought-provoking address, Professor Chetan S Solanki presented an overview of the prevailing alarming state in terms of the increasing pollution and climate change phenomenon, which is going to adversely impact the human species and threaten its sustenance in this planet. He exhorted that the decisive factor in this alarming state is the huge generation and usage of energy, derived from fossil fuels i.e. oil, gas and coal.

Professor Solanki alluded to the dichotomy between growth and climate change and argued that while an increase in the energy supply is needed for growth; a decrease in the energy supply is required for addressing the serious issue of climate change. Thus the key challenge is how to balance the growth without affecting the climate change. He argued for deploying drastic and immediate measures to deal with this alarming situation. Towards such a solution, Professor Solanki urged for switching to 100 per cent solar energy immediately (wherever it's possible) and becoming Atma Nirbhar and adopting energy swarajya. He placed forward the twin principles of "Limited Consumption" and "Localised Production" as key to realise energy swarajya. He further went on to

enumerate the benefits of energy swarajya such as livelihood creation, energy independence, community involvement, strengthening of local and rural economy, energy discipline, energy security and sustainability.

At the end, Professor Solanki advocated a threestep approach for everyone to follow to achieve energy swarajya and mitigate climate change. The first step is to avoid use of energy as much as possible (even if it's solar) by trying to prevent at least by one-third. The second step is to minimize the use of energy as much as possible by practicing discipline and using efficient appliances and try to minimize at least by one-third; and the third step is to generate as little as possible (if possible, only one-third, that too locally!). He argued that this principle or rule of "AMG" (Avoid, Minimize and Generate) is critical for mitigating climate change and achieving energy swarajya. Finally, he appealed for making energy swarajya as a public movement, as government actions alone won't be sufficient to address the challenge of such an enormous proportion.

#### **Enabling the Global Energy Transition: India in the World**

The 41<sup>st</sup> STIP Forum Lecture was delivered by Dr Ajay Mathur, Director General, International Solar Alliance, on 28 February 2022 via an online platform. The topic of this public lecture was "Enabling the Global Energy Transition: India in the World". In his insightful address, Dr Mathur provided an overview of the energy transitions happening in the world and in India. He began his lecture by highlighting that the renewable energy and non-fossil fuels have taken up a substantial share of the electricity generation mix. Dr Mathur enumerated two key public policy interventions that helped India scaled up its solar energy installation to date viz. Price reduction and demand creation. Price reduction has been achieved through a two-stage process comprising of Feed-in Tariffs and Reverse Auctions, whereas demand creation was

#### **Rewiring the Brain**

The 42<sup>nd</sup> STIP Forum Public Lecture was delivered by Dr K Sridhar, Honorary Secretary, Neurological Society of India, on 28 March 2022 via an online platform. The topic of this public lecture was "Rewiring the Brain". Dr Sridhar began his address by providing an overview of the critical role the brain plays in our existence as living being. He elaborated on the various processes in terms achieved through the system of Renewable Purchase Obligations (RPOs). These policy instruments have made renewable energy cost effective and competitive, thus spurring their high intake. However, as mentioned by Dr Mathur, India's trade balance in terms of solar cells and solar modules is extremely skewed at this moment, wherein only 36 per cent of the solar panels installed in India during the FY 2021 were supplied by the domestic manufactures. Another challenge, as pointed by him, is in terms of cost of capital for solar energy projects which is quite high in India as compared to many other countries such as US, China and Europe. He placed high hopes on recently launched PLI scheme to change this scenario in near future.

of neural networks and reactions that happen inside the brain to help us speak, act, smell, think and so on. and Research in Banking Technology established by the RBI, said that although India still examines the pros and cons of adopting central bank digital currency for wide use, digital wallets may become a crucial part of the proposed Central Bank Digital Currency (CBDC) framework in India to help

boost financial inclusion programmes as well as to prevent leakages of government subsidies, according to an expert.

Ambassador (Dr) Mohan Kumar, Chairman, RIS, said Africa and Asia - which are the emerging as the most important digital payments markets due to their young and growing population – must be 'rule-shapers' than 'rule-takers'. He said governments must play the role of facilitators and enablers and help promote harmonisation of rules and share best practices.

Mr Ritesh Shukla, CEO of NPCI International Payments Limited, said P2M (person to merchant payments) transactions are growing in India with more merchants accepting digital payments. He said there is also a greater focus on providing digital payment solutions for people with regular phones (that are not smartphones).

Mr Ganesh Ananthanarayanan, Chief Operating Officer (COO), Airtel Payments Bank, said the key target segment in the digital payments space in India is the 200 million underserved customers including in remote areas.

Mr Kennedy Kipkemboi, Regulatory Specialist, Mobile Money, Programme, GSMA, Kenya, said it is important to reduce the compliance cost including

#### India-Malawi Bilateral Session on Digital Payments

GDC at RIS facilitated a bilateral session between NIPL and Reserve Bank of Malawi. Dr Seshadri Chari, Member, RIS Governing Council chaired the session. The bilateral session was an opportunity for further in-depth technical exchange with respect to the specific requirements of Malawi based on their local contexts.

During the session, the team from Malawi presented details of their country's plan towards advancing digital payment systems and appreciated the potential of experience sharing and peer-learning based on India's those related to initial capital requirements to promote digital payments and ensure a level-playing field.

Mr Mackay Aomu, Director, National Payment Systems, Bank of Uganda, said Uganda is looking into the gaps in regulation including those related to initial capital requirements, and has introduced a six-tier regulatory mechanism to bring in small and medium players.

Ms Olanike Kolawole, Head, Agency Banking, Consumer Bank, Ecobank Nigeria Ltd., spoke about the opportunities in digital payments in Nigeria. Dr Emmanuel Mungongo, Senior Principal Officer, Bank of Tanzania, said there should be greater collaboration among developing countries on improving digital payment product design and reducing barriers.

Ambassador Amar Sinha, Chairman, Advisory Committee - GDC and Distinguished Fellow, RIS, spoke about the importance of sharing the experience of the developing world including India and Africa to mainstream digital payments that boost financial inclusion in the global discourse agenda, develop innovative solutions and build an ecosystem. He said governments must keep a close watch on the sector to prevent fraudulent practices.

experience with UPI and RuPAY Cards. They also shared insights on the Reserve Bank of Malawi's procedures for implementing such a system. # New Technologies and Development Issues Horizon Europe

#### **Tapping Solar Energy: Sharing India's Experience**

India is keen to ensure that solar energy tops the political and economic agenda across all countries through the efforts of the International Solar Alliance (ISA) in greater capacity building programmes, reduction of per unit price and creation of markets, according to Dr Ajay Mathur, Director General, ISA. In this regard, the ISA, launched by India and France, is aiming to channel USD one trillion in the solar energy sector by 2030 across the world, facilitate universal energy access as well as enable green economic recovery of growth along with climate change mitigation and adaptation, he said.

Dr Mathur was speaking at a webinar on 'Tapping Solar Energy: Sharing India's Experience and Forging Partnership with Asia, Pacific Island Countries' organised by RIS and Global Development Centre (GDC) on 17 June 2021.

Mr Chandra Kishore Mishra, Former Secretary, the Ministry of Environment, Forest and Climate Change, Govt. of India, who chaired the panel discussion said it is important for countries to not only reduce carbon emissions but also increase the carbon sink to ensure more carbon dioxide absorption than releases.

Ambassador Amar Sinha, Chairman, Advisory Committee, GDC and Distinguished Fellow, RIS, said India has been proactive in its efforts to go green, rely on solar energy and push the 'One Sun, One World, One Grid' initiative. He amplified that the most crucial

aspect is the interconnected problems of climate change, global warming and the rising sea levels that poses an existential threat to the mankind. The dangers of climate change have also found reflection in the statement of the recent G7 summit.

Dr Christopher Vehe, Permanent Secretary of the Solomon Islands – Ministry of Mines, Energy and Rural Electrification, spoke about the need for strengthening capacity building and skill through effective management of human and financial resources.

The webinar saw a discussion on stimulating renewable energy deployment across the Pacific Island Countries, especially since the islands are endowed with natural resources like sunlight and wind. The challenges faced by the islands include lack of private sector investment, poor capacity to operate and maintain renewable energy systems, particularly for off-grid installations on remote islands, as well as the difficulties in grid integration. There

were also discussions on the scope of India's support and partnerships in solar energy demand assessment plan development, creation of governmental enterprise, capacity building of personnel and help in accessing global finance to build solar power for Pacific Island Countries.

## Forum on Indian Traditional Medicine

Traditional knowledge, medicinal plants, traditional medicine and biological diversity related issues have been on the agenda of RIS for quite some time. In recognition of the work, the Ministry of Ayush set up the Forum on Indian Traditional Medicine (FITM) in RIS. FITM's current research focus is based on the changing role of traditional medicine in national and international discussions. Epidemiological trends, especially growth of NCD burden have stimulated growing global interest and preference for traditional herbal medicines. Today, these systems of medicine are not limited by demand within the countries of origin as is visible in the substantial growth in international export of Ayurvedic and other traditional medicine products. A growing body of clinical research and regulatory reforms with reference to uniformity in standards and quality controls is further adding to its validity. COVID 19 has served to increase global demand for herbal health products further. It has enabled acknowledgement of both preventive and curative aspects of healthcare for sustainable wellness. Traditional medicine in healthcare, being more prevalent in the Global South, is also a significant tool for South-South Cooperation, as is evident in several strategic regional co-operations with and within Africa, BIMSTEC and ASEAN. Protection of traditional medicine and rights of its knowledge holders has also brought the common concerns of the Global South at several international platforms such as WIPO, WHO and WTO. At the same time these systems' strong linkage with biodiversity creates issues of both sustainability of resources and rights of communities associated with it. The drastic health implications of zoonotic diseases in the form of pandemics further reinforces the need for exploration of transdisciplinary approach to health and sustainable utilisation of biodiversity. These include drawing from knowledge sources on sustainable health practices outlined in India's health based texts on Ayurveda, Siddha and Yoga.

The research areas of FITM this year have focussed on new technologies and development issues pertaining to health, economy, trade and environment especially in context of traditional medicine systems. The report 'Ayush Sector in India: Prospects and Challenges', prepared by FITM is a landmark report, the first academic exercise of its kind to understand traditional medicine goods industry in its entirety. It studies Ayush classical and proprietary goods and allied industries of extracts and medicinal plants, its global and national market size, exports, regional distribution along with performance and opportunities in the Ayush manufacturing sector.

Buoyed by the growing global and domestic demand and enabled by a strong support to regulatory, R&D and backend infrastructure by the Ministry

of AYUSH, Indian systems of medicine especially Yoga and Ayurveda have shown tremendous growth in the last few years. Ease of business in the sector is being facilitated at several fronts. Along with special incentives under 'Make-in-India' and 'Start Up India', India allows 100 per cent FDI in AYUSH industry. At the central level, programmes for a sustained supply of medicinal plants through cultivation/collection and market linkage in contract farming are being undertaken. Against this backdrop it was felt that policy support to the sector could be greatly enhanced with a study an estimation of the size of the sector and an understanding of its key strengths. An estimated \$18 billion industry size, as brought out by the study, has provided policy makers with the necessary insights on scale of operations and guidance on the key aspects of the industry.

While an estimation of the market and trade prospects of Ayush was to serve the objective of promotion of the sector by the Ministry of Ayush, a Round Table Discussion on 'Ayush Sctor Promotion: Identifying Product Categories for Financial and Regulatory Support' elicited views from stakeholders on mechanisms for enhancing export potential of the sector with the necessary policy support.

Biodiversity is the key source of medicinal plants, the principal raw materials for Traditional Medicines. Local communities have long been the preservers of the biological resources and the medicinal knowledge associated with them. Issues of access, benefit sharing with these communities and their positioning vis a vis narratives on rights and ownership has long been a global debate. International discussions on human rights have thrown up questions on appropriate terms to refer to such people, be it historically, socially or economically. The appropriate use of the term 'indigenous' and how it shapes legal narratives on rights and development both nationally and internationally becomes important in this context. In this backdrop, FITM organised a Panel Discussion based on the RIS Discussion Paper 'International Discussions on Indigenous People and India' by Prof T.C. James, Visiting Fellow, RIS.

Biodiversity and its sustainable use have also been at the heart of multilateral discussions specially in the face of intensified, global circulation of pathogens like COVID 19 where we recognize that managing risk is not possible in one country alone. Understanding links between humans, animals, and the environment, how these links are integral to understanding disease dynamics, and the importance of interdisciplinary approaches to prevention, education, investment, and policy development are imperative. The Concept of One Health is a collaborative, multisectoral, and transdisciplinary approach—working at the local, regional, national, and global levels—with the goal of achieving optimal health outcomes recognizing the interconnection between people, animals, plants, and their shared environment. The conceptual core of 'One World One Health', the understanding of zoonoses can be traced in the India's traditional health texts. FITM's first Invited Lecture, delivered by the Chairperson of University Grants Commission, Prof Jagadesh Kumar, dwelled on the key aspects of the national and global positioning of One Health with an integrative, multidisciplinary approach for a global health agenda.

Building on its mandate for policy research on economy and governance of traditional medicines in global and national arena, FITM has also launched its Journal, the *Traditional Medicine Review*. Its aim is to bring out academic outputs to generate debate on economy, trade, IPR, international healthcare cooperation, legislation and policy responses in the field of traditional medicine. A biannual Journal the two issues brought out in October 2021, and April 2022 have covered subjects ranging from trade promotion, regulatory reforms for health insurance to digital technologies, standardisation of terminologies and innovation in traditional medicine healthcare systems.

# **Translational Research through Traditional Medicines for Holistic Health Care**

The 40th STIP Forum Lecture was delivered by Vaidya Shri Rajesh Kotecha, Secretary, Ministry of AYUSH, Government of India, on 23 February 2022 via online platform. The topic of this public lecture was "Translational Research through Traditional Medicines for Holistic Health Care". The event was moderated by Dr Kinkini Dasgupta Misra, Scientist F, Vigyan Prasar.

Vaidya Shri Rajesh Kotecha began his very insightful address by providing an overview of the concept of holistic health care and highlighted the key role

traditional medicines can play in achieving holistic health care. Vaidya Shri Kotecha elaborated on the translational approach through Ayurveda and explained in detail how well the whole Ayurveda knowledge system is itself structured as translational model. The three tier structure of the Ayurvedic knowledge system comprising of 'Taatva' (principles), 'Shastra' (theoretical constructs) and 'Vyawahar' (practical applications) is aimed to ensure that the academic insights get translated into practical application. The Ayurvedic knowledge system is also engrained in the process of translation through science, rationale and experience. initiative for the promotion of healthy lifestyle through Ayush system in 75,000 schools. He also shared the list of extensive AYUSH research done on COVID-19 across the country during the pandemic.

At the end, Vaidya Shri Rajesh Kotecha put forward some key pointers as way forward, which included inter alia a call for facilitating more inter-disciplinary collaborative research studies; envisioning a National AYUSH Research Consortium; promoting industryacademia collaboration and setting-up on an intuitional mechanism for translational research to convert evidences and experiences into practical implementation.

Vaidya Shri Kotecha further shared some successful instances of integration of AYUSH in the mainstream public health care schemes and programmes. He highlighted the cases of integration of AYUSH in the National Programme for Prevention and Control of Cancer, Diabetes, Cardiovascular Diseases and Stroke (NPCDCS), National Reproductive and Child Healthcare (RCH) Programme like SUPRAJA Initiative, Geriatric Healthcare through VAYO MITRA, Palliative Survives (KARUNYA). Vaidya Shri Kotecha also mentioned about AYURVIDYA, a new AYUSH Ministry

#### **International Discussions on Indigenous People and India**



# Gender Equality in Social Cohesion Perspectives

Gender equality has always been a contested issue in the light of women's economic, social, cultural and political conditions across national, regional and international arenas which focus on common shared problems faced by the women, both in developed and developing countries that have persisted for long time. Gender equality is not only a fundamental human right, but a necessary foundation for a peaceful, social coherent and sustainable world. Providing women and girls with equal access to education, health care, decent work, and representation in political and economic decision-making processes would fuel sustainable economies and benefit societies and humanity at large.

Women, who are contributing effectively in the growth of the development of nations, sharing wide variety of responsibilities, playing a pivotal role in upbringing their children and supplementing the family income, are still being blatantly discriminated at every level. Despite various measures, initiatives and efforts at a range of levels, gender disparity in respect of health care, nutrition, education, employment, decision making and more importantly political participation still exists all over the world. However, as a priority, investments in the social sector are the prerequisite to achieve social equity, inclusive growth, social cohesion and shared prosperity as well. There is a direct relationship between gender equality and social cohesion as more equal society is a more cohesive society.

Gender discrimination and continued gender gaps have been the most pertinent social problems facing the global community. These problems have received considerable attention particularly during the past few decades through a series of initiatives at international, regional and national levels. This process was formally initiated through the programmes centering on the International

Women's Year in 1975. The process of empowering women was initiated more specifically since 1975, which was designated as International Women's Year by the UN General Assembly, when the 1<sup>st</sup> World Women Conference was held in Mexico. It further received a major impetus at the 4<sup>th</sup> World Conference on Women in Beijing, in 1995, which heralded a new era giving a fresh vision to women empowerment all over the world. While the impact of various developmental policies, plans and programmes implemented over the last few decades have brought forth perceptible improvement in the socio-economic status of women, however, problems like illiteracy, ignorance, discrimination, inequality and violence continue to persist even today. However, the overall socio-economic and development of a nation requires maximum utilization of human resources without any discrimination on the basis of caste, creed, religion or sex.

Over the last few decades, gender and development have indeed been discussed a great deal. Generally, the discussions have focused on ensuring equal opportunities for women and men particularly social and economic rights, mainly in poor economies where human deprivations are frequently depicted in terms of limited and unequal access to food, nutrition, health care, education and job opportunities. Consequently women's political rights have been ignored or neglected, as has been argued by social thinkers that as priority women need adequate food, basic health care services and educational opportunities rather than right to participate in politics or public decision making.

Gender became an issue during the First United Nations Decade, 1960-70, when it was found that planned development efforts which were meant to improve the lives of the community as a whole, were either not helping women or were actually harming them in many ways. Such a state of affair was indeed a major concern especially when the benefits of development was not reaching the poor or to the women. There were evidences of under employment, food shortages and polarization between the rich and the poor. As a result of these, and the pressures from below, the goals of development and the means for their achievement were re-examined. During the Second Development Decade 1970-80, NGOs working in the rural areas in many developing countries pointed out the absence of participation by the poor and the women in development programmes.

Earlier one talked about 'Women in Development' (WID), which aimed at meeting women's basic needs and making use of women's traditional skills and abilities for achieving the goals of development. It later changed to 'Women and Development' to remove the impression that they are not only the beneficiaries of development, but they are also participants and contributors in development process. The emphasis has now shifted to Gender and Development (GAD) since the 1980s bringing the concept of empowerment of women along with men. It also shifted from a welfare approach to a basic needs and efficiency approach, and thereafter to the women's empowerment approach.

#### Gender Equality in Social Cohesion Perspectives

According to the World Economic Forum's Global Gender Gap Report, 2022, it will take another 132 years to close gender gap worldwide based on the current rate of progress. Therefore, there is need to emphasize on the importance of integrating gender issues into the public policy, as public actions and public policy are both important for gender equality and maintaining social cohesion in the societies. Further, budgetary and monetary policies should incorporate gender concerns in the economic growth recovery process during the pandemic. Therefore, thrust should be on social inclusion in a true sense that are pro-poor policies which ensure the wellbeing of each individual and protect the poor and vulnerable sections of the society who are excluded from the mainstream development policies due to inherent challenges faced by them in terms of human vulnerabilities or natural calamities. As disparities are seen worldwide in the provision of and access to basic services, socially and economically disadvantaged groups of society, have not benefitted equally or lagged behind from the mainstream of the development policies, due to deep rooted unequal social structures of societies.

World has faced gruesome effects of the COVID-19 pandemic since early 2020, with the periodic resurgence of various new variants. This has impacted, men, women, elderly and even children having serious implications of the pandemic. Pandemic induced restrictions were one of the major setbacks in exacerbating existing inter-country and intra-country disparities in social and economic development. World-wide deepening of social and economic and social inequalities during pandemic has been widely acknowledged. The impact of pandemic on women, the world over, has not only been in terms of social and economic vulnerabilities but has also resulted into increased inequalities that disturb the social cohesion in various spheres. Further, this vulnerability factor exposed the women due to lack of access to social safety nets.

India would hold the G20 Presidency from December 2022 onwards for a period of one year. As during the last few Presidencies of G-20, gender empowerment has also been one of the major priority areas on the G-20 agenda. In general, women face more challenges than their male counterparts, when it comes to labour participation and access to decent jobs. As has been analyzed in the last four G-20 Presidencies, it has been observed that, there has not been any separate Task Force theme for women empowerment, except in Argentina in 2018. Many Task Forces of different Presidencies are mainly pertaining to the issue of social cohesion, global governance and the future of welfare systems etc which partially also touched upon the issue of women empowerment.

In order to explore gender issues in G20, RIS organised a special Panel Discussion on '*Women's Issues in G-20 and Way Forward*' with participation from distinguished panelists on Women's Day itself. At the outset, it was highlighted that in Brisbane, at the core of the G20, Women 20 (W 20) urged all member countries to advance member states policies towards the '25 by 25' target set by

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G20 for reducing the gender gap in labour force participation rate by 2025 by putting forward national plan of actions. This is one of the commitments that is still to be achieved in several G20 countries. Further, issues of gender discrimination, skilled labour, finance, gender budgeting and technology are being stressed on the commitments of the G20 national and international mechanisms. The Ministry of Finance in the respective G20 countries has the important role to play in G20 Forum which is a specialized forum to finance human development and gender equality as an important public good. Gender budgeting in G20 countries is also a promising framework to deal with gender issues.

In India being the fastest growing economy in the world, the majority of the population does not uniformly share the benefits of development that the elitist population enjoys due to the presence of widespread inequality in access to education, healthcare, income and overall development. India's vast geographical area, huge ethnic and cultural diversity and widespread social and economic inequalities lead to less cohesive societies. In order to achieve social cohesion, there is a need for overall development for all sections of the society, irrespective of caste, creed and gender.

In fact, T20 Final Communiqué of Italy believes that the G20 has a crucial role in ensuring that the recovery from the pandemic preserves social cohesion. Apart from these, the Governments in these G20 countries should work effectively in close partnership with the public, private organizations and civil society organizations in order to have more cohesive societies and bring significant improvement in the socio-economic conditions of women.

# Data and Information Centre

The Documentation Centre at RIS has obtained vast collection of latest specialized publications, reports, databases, e-journals and articles, etc. for providing upto-date information to RIS Faculty and visiting scholars. There are more than 350 CD Roms and databases. and being a member of DELNET, it promotes resource-sharing. The Current Awareness Service is provided to the Faculty on regular basis.


The intranet facility for faculty and administrative staff with password protected information to employees regarding their service matters, including leave records, salary slips, medical reimbursements, and other details.


